BEGINS ANOTHER

HOT LAKE SANATORIUM IS BE-COMING NOWN FROM OCEAN TO OCEAN.

Beginning with the improvement of he promenade at Hot Lake Sanatorium doubtless a campaign of rearrangement and addition has been started that will reach far into next eason and will enlarge that great instilution sufficiently to care for the constantly increasing business.

When it is considered what was of Hot Lake seven years ago and what is there today one can but wonder at the marvelous transformation, Seven years ago the sanatorium building would only accommodate in a manner fifty patients. There was but one nurse who also acted in capacity of housekeeper. The water for domestic purposes was hauled in barrels on a sled. Grocory and supplies were delivered to the sanatorium in a spring wagon that proved adequate for the demands of transportation. A total number of twelve employes constituted the force at the Lake, Laundry was shipped out to La Grande, There was no telephone connection with the outside world. The bath house would only take care of ten to twolve potients, while the doctor's office and treatment room was one and the same. No steward, no bookkeeper, no checking clerks, no bell boys, in fact one man-the clerk-did it all. A 15-horse gesoline ongine furnished electric current for the institution, and in fast Hot Lake was only a small speck either on the map or in the minds of the

But what is the institution today? None its equal in the Northwest and very few in the United States Today the buildin accommodates 250 patients with most modern apartments possible for the skilled architects to build. Twenty-two nurses are regularly employed. Weter for domestic purposes is brought to the institution in a private water plant which consists of a cement reservoir of 130,000 gallons capacity. It is distributed over the large building through mains perfeetly plumbed and scientifically arranged. The electric current used from the main power line amounts to 125 horse power each twenty-four hours. It is interesting to know what ortant part the electricity per forms there. Besides being used for lighting and for running the elevators, it does the cooking in the diet kitchen, runs the machine shop and wood working department where all institution furniture is manufactured, runs the laundry where each week 20,000 pieces of linea are laundered, sweeps floors and rugs, peels the potatoes, griads the coffee, washes the dishes and is entensively used in the electric mas-

sage department of the bath house. Whore seven years ago the spring wagon carried the groceries from La Grande to Hot Lake now a commissary is established in the institution that carries a stock of \$20,000. The sanatorium is one of the largest carload shippers on the C. R. & N. outalde of Portland and att the present lime a carload of canned goods is beog 'unloaded there.

The office force which formerly consisted of the one clerk, now includes the day and night clerks, bell boys, bookkeepers, stenographers, checking clerks, and information man who is civrays at the service of the guests.

The doctor's office formerly combined with the treatment room, now consists of a suite of nine rooms. Also there are labratory, treatment and X-Ray rooms. The surgery room is porcelain lined, hermetically scaled and cannot be surpassed by any other institution. During the past year over 600 major operations have been performed at the Ho: Lake sanatorium. The merit of the place heretofore
