TWO BROTHERS DROWNED

Bodies of Eza and Winnie Smith Found in Icy Waters of Lake Coeur d'Alene.

The bodies of Eza and Winnie Smith, who were drowned in Lake Coeur d'Alene last Saturday morning, were buried in the Bethel cemetery in this county, Tuesday afternoon.

The particulars of the drowning of these two young men will never be known, as no one was near them when the accident happened. They had been employed in a sawmill at Harrison, Idaho, and early last Saturday morning decided to take a holiday and spend the day hunting ducks on Lake Coeur d'Alene.

The bodies were at once prepared for shipment to Oregon for burial, and were accompanied on the sad journey by the heart-broken parents and several friends from Washtucna, Wash.

Arriving at Salem, Tuesday, the remains were taken to the Oak Grove church, where the funeral services were conducted by Rev. H. A. Ketchum.

Eza and Winnie Smith were sons of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Smith, and were aged 25 years and 20 years respectively. The family moved from Oak Grove, Washtucna, Wash., only two or three months ago.

Side by side in the quiet churchyard at Bethel repose the mortal remains of the three brothers—three young men, who, but one brief year ago, rejoicing in their love and happy in their companionship, were enjoying the sunny morning of life and looking forward with all the enthusiasm of youth to a bright and prosperous career.

SERIOUS FAMILY ROW

Emmit Gaar Smashes Albert Reuf's Skull With a Club.

Albert Reuf is in a very serious condition as a result of a quarrel with his brother Wednesday afternoon. Albert and George Reuf met in the road south of Independence and were having some hard words over some hay, when the brother-in-law of George Reuf, Emmit Gaar, rushed in and hit Albert Reuf over the head with a club, maiming his skull.

Albert was immediately taken to Independence, where Drs. Ketchum and Crowley examined the wound and found him in such a critical condition that they had him removed to the hospital at Salem for treatment.

The Reufs are well-known farmers and are both well-to-do. Both purchased large farms near Independence this summer. Emmit Gaar came to Independence with the rest of the party.

Gaar has been arrested and placed in jail. The men are all married and have families.
