DIED OF APOPLEXY

Mrs. J. A. Coovert Passes Away After an Illness Lasting Less Than Two Hours.

Mrs. J. A. Coovert died of apoplexy at her home on the Boise farm, two miles west of Dallas, at 9 o'clock Saturday night. She was apparently in the best of health up to an hour before her death, and had spent the evening in reading and talking to the members of the family. She retired at 8 o'clock and had been in bed but a few minutes when the family heard her breathing heavily and struggling as if to arise. Mr. Coovert rushed to her assistance, and found her choking and fighting for breath. He assisted her to a chair and applied such remedies as were at hand in the hope of relieving her distress. All efforts to restore her were unavailing, and she sank rapidly, passing away at 9 o'clock. Mrs. Coovert was about 40 years old, and leaves a husband and three children. The family came to Dallas from Turner, Marion county, several months ago. The funeral services were held Wednesday morning, and the remains were taken to Turner for burial.

In the year 1843, the Applegate brothers, Jesse, Charles and Lindsay, crossed the plains to Oregon and settled in Polk county in what is now known as the Salt Creek neighborhood. This was the first immigration of white men to Polk county, and but three families other than those of the Applegate brothers settled in Polk county in that year. The three brothers took an active part in the upbuilding of the country, and their sons, following in their footsteps, have long been prominent in public affairs. Jesse A. Applegate, a son of Jesse Applegate, has been a resident of Klamath county for many years, and his letters descriptive of pioneer life in Oregon, have often appeared in the columns of the OREGONIAN. This week we begin the publication of his juvenile memoirs, which give a graphic account of the long trip across the plains to Oregon in 1843. In the opening chapter he recounts many amusing incidents of his boyhood days, in a manner which, we are sure, will delight our juvenile readers.

DROWNED AT SILVERTON

Prof. William Parker's Son Falls From Bridge and is Swept Away by Current.

The 12-year-old son of Professor William Parker, principal of the public schools of Silverton, was drowned in Silver Creek at 5:30 Tuesday evening. The lad was out hunting the cow and, when last seen alive, was driving her toward the creek. It is supposed that in attempting to cross the stream at a near-by bridge he fell in and was caught in the swift current. As soon as he was missed a searching party was organized, fully 150 citizens joining in the effort to locate the body. At 10:30 it was discovered a few hundred yards below the bridge, lodged in some driftwood. The skull was fractured. This is a great shock to the parents, the father having just recovered from a severe illness and the mother now being dangerously ill with appendicitis.


