## HONOR SOLDIERS IN CHURCH SERVICE

APPROPRIATE EXERCISES CONDUCTED BY REV. FIELDS.

Members of Soldiers' and Sailors' Association and National Guard Attend in a Body; Able Address.

Appropriate memorial services were conducted at the Methodist church on Sunday night participated in by the members of the Polk County Soldiers' and Sailors' association, company G, O. N. G., and by the congregations of other churches. A very able address was delivered by Rev. L. R. Fields, in which the speaker took occasion to pay a high tribute to the soldiers and sailors, living and dead who responded in the hour of their country's need and whose loyalty to the flag has ever been an inspiration and a shining mark in the history of the nation. He lauded the patriotism that actuated their sacrifices and called attention to the urgent need of bestowing a fitting tribute upon their memory, and this feeling on the part of a grateful country led to the establishment of the annual memorial or decoration day ceremony. The remarks were listened to with profound attention and made a deep impression on the audience which completely filled the church.

### March to Church.

Promptly at 7:30 ten members of the Polk County Soldiers' and Sailors' association met at the National Guard armory and, with their ladies, marched to the Methodist church, accompanied by company G, O. N. G., under command of Capt. Walter L. Toose, Jr., as a guard of honor. They were assigned to seats that had been reserved for them in the front of the auditorium.

Special music by the choir rendered the occasion especially significant, two anthems appropriate to the day being especially well received. The church was elaborately and tastefully decorated with the National colors and with roses and other flowers, the whole auditorium being transferred into a bower of beauty.

Following Rev. Fields' address, Capt. Toose was called upon and made a few remarks in which he, too, took occasion to pay a tribute to the old soldiers and the services

they rendered to their country and the sacrifices they made.

Following the regular program, Mrs. D. L. Fields presented each old soldier, their wives and each member of the National Guard with a rose.

### FINAL CALL COMES SUDDENLY

Death Summons Dallas Resident as He Talks With Wife.

Martin W. Hisey died suddenly at his home in East Dallas Sunday night from hemorrhage, aged about 68 years. He leaves a wife and a son in North Bend, Oregon. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made pending instructions from North Bend, but will probably take place on Thursday.

Mr. Hisey and wife came to Dallas from Ouray, Colorado, last February and settled on a three acre tract in the eastern part of the city upon which a small dwelling was built. He had not been in the best of health since coming here but had been about as usual and even on Sunday afternoon came down town with Mrs. Hisey. He later returned home and, while sitting on a block of wood in the yard, was suddenly seized with a fit of coughing which was followed by the hemorrhage which ended in death.

Deceased was born in Schilthorn, Switzerland, in 1844. He came to America when a lad and settled in Iowa. When the civil war broke out he enlisted as a corporal in company G, Seventh Regiment Iowa volunteer infantry, July 22, 1861 and served during the war being honorably discharged at Louisville, Ky., July 12, 1865.

This name was unintentionally omitted from the list of soldiers heretofore published.

## Oxen Used In Heavy Farm Work In Sussex, England

SEARCHERS for the primitive and picturesque in England need not go far afield, even if their starting point is London itself. Within little more than an hour's railway journey from the metropolis one may find secluded hamlets where the automobile is almost unknown and where farm work is done with the aid of lumbering oxen. On Housedean farm, at Falmer, in Sussex, oxen are so employed, being better adapted than horses to heavy work on the rolling chalk downs. Their remarkable strength is shown by the ease with which the team shown in the illustrations haul a load of tons up the steep hillside or plow the chalky soil. The wheat harvest in this beautiful southern county would be an interesting scene even if the draft animals were the shire horses commonly used in other parts of England, but the great sluggish oxen, with their deliberate movements, lend additional charm to the rural landscape. The teamster who stands beside the oxen is worthy of notice. He has worked on the same farm without a holiday for forty years and is still healthy and active.
