RAILROAD STOCKS HAVE LIVELY DAY ON N. Y. MARKET

New York, Oct. 8.—A vigorous advance of railroad shares was the feature of today's market. After a morning session, in which war stocks advanced rapidly and then became inactive, standard railroads were taken in hand and whirled upward, many to new high marks for the year. The upward move began at midday, quietly at first, resulting in a net gain of from two to more than seven points in all the principal transportation shares, the market closing decidedly stronger and extremely active.

Reading, Lehigh Valley, New Haven and Union Pacific led. The volume of activity closely matched yesterday's.
