

SEATTLE STORAGE COMPANIES TO PAY HEAVY FINES

Seattle, Oct. 16.—Seattle's pretty woman justice of the peace, Miss Reah Whitehead, today levied a fine of \$250 each against the Cudahy Packing company and Morris & Com-

pany, both charged with having adulterated foods in their possession. Will H. Adams, state pure food inspector, brought the action after he had seized 2,966 storage chickens which he says were unfit for human consumption.

ARMED WIDOW HOLDS SHERIFF'S DEPUTIES AT BAY IN SEATTLE

Seattle, Oct. 16.—Armed with a shotgun and rifle, Mrs. Sarah Bigelow, a widow, 47 years old, is still holding the fort today at her home, 1234 Lakeview boulevard, against any invasion by deputy sheriffs, who have been ordered to eject her under mortgage foreclosure proceedings. She routed four deputies yesterday afternoon, after barricading the doors. Emphasizing her determination, she hurled a challenge at them offering to duel any one of them with either rifle or shotgun—and settle the controversy that way. No attempt was made by the deputies to storm the house.

"I'll shoot the first man to come in here," she told Deputies Rogers and Brewer, who made the latest attempt to serve a writ of dispossession upon her. This is my home, and I'm going to protect it, court order or no court order, and no sheriff is going to get me out alive."

The mortgage on the house and lots, amounting to \$2,000, fell due last December and in April the property was sold under foreclosure proceedings to the Eggert Shoe company. She refused to move out. She claimed she was entitled to live in the house one year, the period allowed by law for redemption of mortgages.

Mrs. Bigelow has a married daughter, and through her and friends she hopes to get sufficient food brought to her to keep her while she is protecting her home.

LITERATURE SENT TO INTERNED CIVILIANS

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—A large quantity of exposition literature is today on its way to Douglas allen camp, Isle of Man, following the receipt by President Moore of the Panama exposition of a letter from civilian prisoner number 2973 at that camp.

An index number appended to the letter shows that "No. 2973" is Dr. W. A. Dyes, and the physician's letter declares that he and a "very great number of gentlemen" have been interned for a year and that their reading supply is running low.

DEATH OF PORTLAND GIRL CAUSE OF INVESTIGATION

Portland, Oct. 16.—The body of the girl who died on the operating table in the office of Dr. A. A. Ausplund late yesterday was identified today as that of Miss Anna Anderson, a domestic in the home of Fred P. Green, a timberman.

As a result of the assertion of Corner Dammasch that the girl had undergone a criminal operation, a rigid investigation was under way.

Dr. Ausplund denied all knowledge of the case when questioned by District Attorney Evans, with the exception that the girl died while being examined. It was the opinion of the doctor that the girl had operated on herself.

SEALS AND STARS TO PLAY COAST SERIES

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—Henry Berry, owner of the Seals, today practically completed details for a post-season series of five games between the Seals and an all-star team composed of major league players. Berry proposes to start the series here October 27 and then go to Los Angeles for a similar number of games.

EDISON TO DINE WITH KNIGHTS OF THE KEY AT FRISCO

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—Thomas A. Edison today accepted by telegraph an invitation to attend a dinner in his honor tendered by the telegraph operators of San Francisco. The famous inventor, now en route to San Francisco, where he will be the central figure at the exposition, expressed his delight over the plan and one of the most unique affairs of its kind will bring the wizard and the "knights of the key" together Tuesday evening at the San Francisco Commercial club.

The menus for the Edison dinner will be printed in dots and dashes and what speech-making is done will be over keys and sounders, which will be installed in front of each guest at the table. Tiny telegraph poles will carry the wires about the table and the music for the occasion will come from a number of phonographs.

It is planned to make a dictaphone record of Edison's "sending," and to have the local end of the longest wire ever made up come to his plate. Edison is an old-time telegrapher of note.

MAN SUSPECTED OF FORGERY GIVES UP TO THE POLICE

Portland, Oct. 16.—Arrested in Woodland, Wash., after he had notified Burns detectives of his whereabouts, Richard A. Henry, 25 years old, is in jail here today awaiting preliminary hearing on the charge of passing a forged check for \$1,287.43 on the First National bank. The alleged fraudulent check purported to be signed by Stone & Hicks, the contractors for whom he worked. Henry had had an account at the bank and several checks signed by Stone & Hicks had been deposited. As a result the one alleged to have been forged attracted no attention.

After purchasing clothing to the extent of \$300, including a dress suit and top hat, Henry is alleged to have written his wife that he intended to commit suicide, and then disappeared.

The detectives traced him through the leather case in which he carried the top hat to Seattle, Vancouver and Calgary. From Calgary he returned to Woodland and notified the detectives where he could be found.

Henry was formerly cashier of a bank in Woodland and city recorder.


