cabinet upheaval, the premier commented:

"I will not shift the burden of office from my own shoulders until I am satisfied I can no longer bear it. I am not here to apologize for the government, which to the best of its ability has controlled operations with the confidence of the great mass of the people."

Asquith's announcement — his promised statement of the war situation—created a profound impression in the house of commons.

Concerning cabinet differences over conscription, the premier said:

"In my opinion, it is a question of purely practical expediency. I do not rule out compulsion, but I hold it should be resorted to only by mutual consent. As long as I enjoy the confidence of my sovereign and the commons I will not surrender the task, great as it is. I am confident, as I was 15 months ago, that we will carry our righteous cause to a triumphant conclusion."

The British force now in France and Flanders numbers 1,000,000. Asquith said. These figures were rather higher than had generally been thought.

While admitting that the British casualties have been 377,000 along their front in Flanders, Asquith offset this with the cheering news that two German or Turkish battleships, five gunboats, one torpedo boat, eight transports and 137 supply ships had been sunk or damaged by British submarines in the Sea of Marmora.

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 2.—Eleven convicts, six of them "lifers" serving murder terms, were free today under Governor Brewer's pardon because they offered their lives for pellagra experiments. Six of them are afflicted with the dread disease.

FRISCO SALOONMAN LOSES \$25 TO ROBBERS

San Francisco, Nov. 2.—G. Kukler, a saloonman was still shaking today—and not for the drinks either—as a result of a bold hold-up last night at his place. In fact Kukler was so frightened when two masked men pushed a "cannon" in his face that he stood stock still for an hour before notifying the police. The robbers got \$25.

BALLAINES WIN TITLE TO SEWARD TOWNSITE

Seward, Alaska, Nov. 2.—The district court yesterday rendered a verdict in favor of John E. and Frank Ballaine, defendants in the suit for the ownership of the townsite of Seward, brought by the Alaska Northern railway. The Ballaines paid \$4,000 for the land, which is now valued at considerably more than \$1,000,000.

THE EXPOSITION CITY HAS DAY OF ITS OWN

San Francisco, Nov. 2.—"San Francisco knows how," the 78 turnstiles at the Panama exposition seemed to assert as San Franciscans, aided by adjoining bay cities and towns, trooped through the exposition gates today to celebrate their "day" at the fair.

As early as 8 o'clock, with the gates opened, the rush for the exposition grounds began, and steady streams flowed toward the exposition thereafter without interruption. From the early morning attendance it appeared that the slogan of three hundred thousand attendance would come close to materializing.

Special schedules are in effect on all ferries leading into San Francisco from cities across the bay, and in the city every car was pressed into service.

Passenger traffic men estimated that fully 100,000 visitors had arrived in San Francisco from all parts of the state, as well as many hundreds from the east.

Leaden skies early today caused some apprehension as to the weather. The heavy traffic on the ferries indicated that Alameda county's promise that 100,000 of her citizens would help San Francisco celebrate would be fulfilled.

MASON TELLS WHAT WAR MOVES MEAN

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Nov. 2.—Lord Kitchener's powers as minister of war are being broken by the organization of a new general staff in London which will control the future direction of Great Britain's part in the war.

Lord Kitchener's control of the British army has been much more complete than the kaiser's control of the German forces. The kaiser is subordinate to the German general staff, while Kitchener has been virtually supreme.

Criticism of the blunders of the British war office lately has been so emphatic that London is really against Kitchener. The government's decision to appoint a general staff with large powers has been as effective as if it would have been if it had been accompanied by an open onslaught on Kitchener himself. His failure to develop into a military genius was the cause of the new general staff's appointment.

Kitchener will be made to realize by the new move that autocracy must be eliminated.

BRITISH FLEET LOSES TORPEDO BOAT No. 96

London, Nov. 2.—British torpedo boat No. 96 was sunk in a collision at the Strait of Gibraltar, the admiralty announced today.

Two officers and nine men are believed to have been drowned.

DARIO RESTA WINS RACE AT SHEEPSHEAD BAY

Sheepshead Bay, L. I., Nov. 2.—Dario Resta, in a Peugeot car, dashed over the line, victor in the 100-mile auto race here this afternoon. His time was 56 minutes 55.71 seconds, an average of 105.86 miles an hour—a new American record for the distance.
