Woodrow Wilson is president of the United States by virtue of less votes than 21 states have cast for woman suffrage.

Since the United States senate acted on the nation-wide amendment, 1,389,364 votes in eleven states have been cast for the enfranchisement of women.

Baltimore, Nov. 27.—After hearing from Henry Ford concerning his peace ship and peace congress plan with the slogan "Out of the Trenches by Christmas," Cardinal Gibbons, like President Wilson, withheld judgment.

The cardinal stated that Ford called to pay his respects and to outline his plan, to which His Eminence listened with interest.

"I'll put up ads myself, asking 'Who's paying for the preparedness ads?'"

"Of course it is the people who profit from the war."

Army, after scoring, kept the ball in Navy's territory. Coffin, of the soldiers, was wasted in a punting duel with von Heimburg.

Navy fumbled soon after the second period opened, but recovered. An Army penalty for off-side play put the ball on Army's 35-yard line, after an exchange of punts.

Soon after Coffin, for Army, missed a forward pass and was interrupted when he tried to punt, but Army recovered the ball on her 15-yard line.

After two line attacks Army punted and it was Navy's ball on its own 35-yard line. Army recovered the ball soon after.

Between the halves, President Wilson, Mrs. Galt and their party crossed the field to the Army side in accordance with the usual custom.

In the third period Craig returned Coffin's kick-off to mid-field. McEwan was right on the job, intercepted a forward pass and reached the Navy's 25-yard line.

A slight drizzle set in. Soon after the touchdown Army got the ball in Navy territory.

Craig intercepted a forward pass shortly after the opening of the fourth period and reached mid-field. Army followed this play by intercepting a long forward pass, after which she reached the Navy's 40-yard line.

Mitchell pierced the Navy's right and reached Navy's 30-yard line. Navy regained the ball on downs.

take off his coat and assist the investigators to get at the bottom of the whole bomb conspiracy.

Crowley's attorney supplemented his statement with an announcement that Crowley had traveled extensively for the German consul and had borne important documents eastward as well as engaging in collecting munitions data.

Tacoma, Nov. 27.—The arrest at San Francisco of C. G. Crowley, in connection with Pacific coast war plots, caused no surprise today to Raleigh Falconer, in jail here on a smuggling charge, who yesterday made a statement asserting he had been offered \$500 to assist in blowing up a dynamite-laden barge in Seattle harbor.

Falconer repeated his newspaper statement last night to secret service and Pinkerton operatives, but insisted he thought he was talking to a representative of the British consulate in Tacoma when he made his original disclosures, instead of to a newspaper reporter.

San Francisco, Nov. 27.—German consul Franz Bopp employed C. G. Crowley, investigator for District Attorney Flickert and former Southern Pacific detective, charged with being an anti-ally bomb plotter.

This much loomed up as a certainty in the case today, Crowley confessed it; Bopp admitted it after having previously denied it.

Crowley was angered at intimations that he had confessed to a part in the nation-wide bomb plotting. His life, he said, had been open, his deeds lawful. Any one claiming differently, he allowed, should be tarred and feathered.

Meantime, he was out on bail, while federal officials sought to run down data to connect him with "higher ups."

Bopp justified his employment of Crowley on the ground that the British consulate had engaged Pinkertons. Moreover, he added, none of Crowley's work had been other than legitimate.

Rumors in federal circles suggested that Attorney Herman Lehke, for the German consulate put up funds with the United States Fidelity and Guarantee company for Crowley's bonds.

Lehke denied it, but Federal District Attorney Preston intimated he may call the company to reveal the actual bondsman when the case goes to the grand jury Monday.

Crowley this afternoon assumed a defiant attitude toward the government officials. They had promised him immunity if he revealed "higher ups"; he answered that they may go ahead and try to prove their case—that he has naught to fear.
