For Child Welfare—The attention of parents particularly, and the public generally, is called to the comprehensive exhibits and literature that will be placed at the disposal of Grants Pass citizens on Friday of this week, and will remain in the city for several days. This exhibit, which will be installed in the Commercial club rooms, is furnished by the Oregon Child Welfare commission, of which Mrs. Robert H. Tate, of Portland, is the president, and it should attract the attention of every citizen who is interested in the conservation of child life. The commission has in view the study of conditions affecting childhood and the passage of such legislation as will safeguard both the physical and moral welfare of the child, in the home as well as in industrial and educational spheres.

WOMEN CAPTURE NAVY SECRETARY

St. Louis, June 13.—Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy, surrendered to the national woman's party today. Innocently he hove into the war zone. His smile was beaming. He was an easy mark for any lurking militant "suff," and in a minute he was surrounded by a whole fleet of feminine destroyers of the peace of mind of prominent democrats. Miss Doris Stevens, of New York, organizer for the woman's party, grabbed the coat lapel of the boss of Uncle Sam's navy and shot the question: "What will you do for the Susan B. Anthony amendment, Mr. Secretary?" she demanded. "I've hardly given the matter a thought," Daniels began. "You told me several months ago in New York," came back Miss Stevens, "that you'd give the matter thought at once." The dreadnaughts of the militants began to edge closer. The sea lanes of possible escape were closed. The secretary ran up the white flag and quit. "I'll do anything I can for you," he said hastily, preparing to run for cover at the first opening, "all that I can, ladies." And then Daniels hurried away.

3 CARRANZISTA SOLDIERS KILLED

El Paso, June 13.—Three Carranza soldiers were today reported to have been killed Sunday night in a clash with negro troops of the Tenth U. S. cavalry between Colonia Dublan and Casas Grandes. Thirteen American troopers taken prisoner by the Carranza detachment are said to have been released afterward. The negroes were returning from a visit to Casas Grandes when they were surrounded by a detachment from the Carranza garrison. The fight followed. Carranzista soldiers are reported to have captured the bandit leaders Dominguez and Vasquez at Temosachic.
