SUGAR COMPANY'S OFFICIALS COMING

T. R. Cutler, general manager of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company, and **W. T. Piper**, assistant secretary of the same company, will arrive in Grants Pass Friday to inspect the progress of work upon the local factory and conditions of the growing fields of beets. They will also be accompanied by **Geo. Austin**, the cultural expert for the sugar company, who has visited this district on a number of occasions before. It will be the first visit of Messrs. Cutler and Piper since the transfer of the local factory to the larger company which they represent. The gentlemen will stop at Sutherland on their way down from the north, where they will be joined by **Alex Nibley**, manager of the factory here, and by **Ed Austin**, field expert, and will return to Grants Pass by auto.

Manager Cutler has just returned from the meeting of representatives of United States sugar manufacturers held at Detroit, where the question of seed supply for American farmers was thoroughly discussed. The Deseret News, of Salt Lake city, contained the following article expressing Mr. Cutler's views:

"Mr. Cutler said today that the main topic discussed in Detroit was the scarcity of sugar beet seed, which threatened to be a more serious problem than ever to many American sugar companies, though the Utah and Idaho concerns were assured an ample supply for next spring planting. Representatives of German seed companies attended the convention and it was learned from them that there were now 800,000 bags of seed in Germany, half of which could be exported if arrangements could be made with the Allies to allow the shipment. This, however, was recognized as out of the question and all the American buyers' attention has now centered on Russia, from whence shipments were made via Vladivostok across the Pacific to Seattle. There is ample seed in Russia if high prices are paid, and shipment (a serious proposition) can be secured across the Pacific.

"Mr. Cutler states that the consensus of opinion at the Detroit meeting was that there was another world shortage of sugar in sight; Germany, Russia and Belgium will only plant half a crop, while that of France will be equally small. Unfavorable weather conditions will keep the Cuban crop down to the same figures as last year.

"In Michigan bad weather has hurt this year's growth of beets, but in Colorado, Utah, Idaho and California the yield will be close to normal, and in some places heavier than last year.

"Mr. Cutler leaves today or tomorrow for Grants Pass, Oregon, to look over the operations there, where the Oregon-Utah Sugar company is building a factory which the Utah, Idaho company has contracted to take over."

ANNOUNCEMENT OF CHILD WELFARE EXHIBIT

I desire to emphasize the announcement of the exhibit to be presented at the Commercial club rooms this week, and to urge the people of the community to attend the exhibit and study the subjects involved. The exhibit is an educational propaganda in the interests of the child life of the state. It consists of panels or screens, each 2 1/2 by 5 feet, and the following are among the subjects presented: Crippled children, dependency and delinquency, child hygiene, schools for the deaf, blind and feeble-minded, respectively, girls' industrial school and boys' training school. Literature covering the various subjects will also be distributed. The purpose and object of the campaign is the attainment, through education and legislation, of better facilities for the care of unfortunate children and to provide measures of prevention of diseases and crime.

The campaign is being waged throughout the state by The Oregon Child Welfare commission, under the appointment of Governor **Withycombe.** The Ladies' Auxiliary is in charge here, and the exhibit opens in the Commercial club rooms in this city on Friday of this week and will continue until Wednesday.
