## TRY CAPTAIN OF BEAR FOR NEGLECT OF DUTY

San Francisco, June 28.—Captain Louis Nopander, master of the wrecked steamer Bear, today was formally charged with neglect of duty and unskillful handling of his steamer by federal inspectors of hulls and boilers. Nopander will be tried this afternoon.

The hearing which resulted in the charges against the captain was secret. It is said about the customs house that serious discrepancies in the captain's testimony respecting his soundings off the Mendocino coast just previous to the wreck were revealed.

Galveston, June 28.—The tank steamer Baton Rouge arrived off the bar shortly after 2 o'clock this afternoon with refugees from Tuxpam.

## YOUTH WILL TEST GEN. WOODS' ORDER

Washington, June 28.—Major-General Leonard Wood's orders that all militiamen over 18 be mustered into service whether or not they have the consent of their parents today resulted in court action that may be a precedent for similar cases reported from every camp in the country.

The action today was taken by Corporal John B. Brockman, 19 years old, who enlisted without his father's consent. His attorney says the law on which General Wood based his order has been superseded. Mobilization officers must show cause in court Friday why Brockman should not be mustered out.

War department officials today ruled that youths who enlisted while some days younger than 18, but who were 18 when actually mustered in, must remain until their enlistment expires.

## MYSTERY SURROUNDS MR. KLINE'S HURRY

Portland, June 28.—Flatly refusing to explain his haste, M. K. Kline dashed into Portland on a special train last night, eluded questioners and disappeared. Rumors of "a race with death" could not be confirmed, nor could Kline's identity be established positively. Kline suddenly caught the speed fever while riding as an ordinary passenger on a Canadian Pacific train Monday. At Revelstoke, B. C., he hired a special train to take him to Sumas, Wash. There he hired another special, which landed him in Portland last night, breaking all records for speed. The two trains cost him more than \$5,000.

A Portland man named L. M. Kline today denied any knowledge of his namesake.

## TEDDY COMES TO VISIT MR. HUGHES

New York, June 28.—Colonel Roosevelt came down tonight to keep his dinner appointment with Charles E. Hughes for tonight. Neither the colonel nor Hughes would discuss a report that efforts were being made to bring Roosevelt and ex-President Taft together. Republican leaders who called at Hughes' headquarters during the day said they would not be surprised if the report was true. Frank Hitchcock, who helped corral Hughes delegates before the Chicago convention and was prominently mentioned for the national chairmanship, called on Hughes today with an offer of his services. W. R. Willcox, new republican national chairman, established headquarters at the Hotel Astor in rooms connecting with the Hughes headquarters.

## VILLA NOT ON THE JOB, SAYS WAR MINISTER OREGON

Mexico City, June 28.—War Minister Oregon today indignantly branded as a fake the report circulated in the United States yesterday that Villa had tendered his services to the constitutional forces and that the tender had been accepted.

## NOTE TO AUSTRIA DEMANDS APOLOGY

Washington, June 28.—The note sent by the United States to Austria June 21 declared the Austrian submarine attack upon the Standard Oil tanker Petrolite "a deliberate insult to the flag of the United States," and demanded an apology from the Austrian government, punishment of the submarine commander and payment of indemnity, it was made known today.

## SAYS WILSON HAS MUDDLED THINGS

Washington, June 28.—President Wilson's handling of the Mexican problem is a "dilly-dally, wishy-washy, hog wallow policy," "Uncle Joe" Cannon declared today in the house. If he were president, he said, he would establish a military government in Mexico City and support it by force until a Mexican could be found who would maintain peace and order.

"God knows I don't want Mexico," shouted Cannon. "I do not think we need it, but we can't get anywhere by feeding soothing syrup to bandits. I would go into Mexico in a manly, straightforward way and tell the Mexicans that we must have peace and order. I would not leave the country until we had written into its fundamental law a provision that the United States might intervene as it may do in Cuba in case orderly government is not maintained."

"Wouldn't you make Mexico, with all its wealth, pay for the great expenditure we would undergo to pacifying that country?" asked Congressman Taggart of Kansas.

"Well we can settle that when the time comes," answered Cannon.

The debate was precipitated by consideration of emergency appropriations of \$25,000,000 for the army and navy.

## GALVESTON MEXICANS WOULD JOIN CARRANZA

Galveston, Texas, June 28.—Hundreds of Mexicans of all factions quit work in Galveston last night and today in connection with an alleged plot to return to Mexico and enlist in the Carranza armies. It is understood that the plot was frustrated and that the arrest of several prominent Mexicans will follow.
