JOHNSON QUALIFIES FOR REPUBLICAN NOMINATION

Sacramento, July 20.—Governor Hiram Johnson qualified today to make the race for republican senator by filing petitions with the secretary of state containing 1,684 signatures. This was 120 more signatures than the required number. His campaign headquarters say other republican petitions will be filed this week, bringing the total number of republican signatures up to the maximum, 6,253.

Johnson has now qualified on both the progressive and republican tickets.
