

#### FRENCH ADVANCE.

man positions. It was from this trench that French infantry was destined to make the attack, thus reducing the width of the fire zone it was necessary for the soldiers to cross before reaching the German trenches. While the usual terrific artillery preparation was going on, the French were systematically destroying the German wire entanglements with their new aerial torpedoes. These they launched from little trench mortars.

Unlike the screaming and whistling of the shells, the passage of these torpedoes is noiseless, but they are visible to the naked eye throughout their entire course. They described beautiful arches above the French line, then darted downward with lightning-like rapidity into the German trench. The havoc and consternation were so great that the French soldiers, without hesitation, poked their heads out of the trenches to watch the destruction, though the Germans were only 150 feet away.

From the depths of this first line

trench seventeen French sausage balloons and thirty observation aeroplanes could be observed directly above the French fire. These were constantly protected during their observation work by a squadron of smaller, faster aviators de chaisse. It is to this duty that all the American volunteer aviators on this front are assigned.

During the day only two German aviators appeared, seizing favorable moments to direct their machine guns at a French trench. The German flyers refused to fight the French aviators, who were constantly engaged in chasing them back to their own lines. Soldiers in the first line trenches said that nothing gave them greater confidence, or a greater feeling of security during a battle than the ability to always look up and see French sausages and aeroplanes hovering protectingly above, undisputed masters of the air.

As we were returning to the rear, toward dusk, the Germans evidently were getting ready for the attack made by the French the next day. They launched a terrific barrage fire near Denicourt, though the French made no effort to attack during the night, and did not leave their trenches until the following day.

plant. Five plucky enginemen tried to force their way through and pleaded in vain that a fire in the plant might wipe out a large part of the city should it spread to the large tanks of oil.

Strikers seized the 22nd street station of the Central Railroad of New Jersey and threatened a jail delivery until turned back by Michael F. Reilly, chief of police, yesterday.

Bayonne officials announced shortly after midnight that they would not ask for militia. Nelson B. Gaskill, judge advocate general of the militia, sent here by Governor Fielder, to investigate the strike situation, announced today he saw no need "as yet" for a militia call.

Strikers returned to Greenburg's saloon today and wrecked the place. In sentencing Ambrose Carlo, 19 years old, for rioting, Recorder Cain announced today that the police had been instructed to shoot to kill if necessary to quell rioting. Seventy-five citizen deputies patrolled the city today while the regular patrolmen were on strike duty. One hundred Gen-

eral Chemical workmen applied to the police for protection today, declaring they had been offered \$15 a week bonus to return to work and wished police protection so that they might accept.

The Central Railroad of New Jer-

sey posted 15 men, armed with Winchester rifles, at the Twenty-Second street station, which was captured by the strikers yesterday, and prepared to handle traffic at the station. No trains had been stopping at the station, which is in the striking district.

London, Oct. 12.—A British cavalry brigade cleared the country around Seres of Bulgarian troops, but found the city of Seres itself strongly occupied by the Bulgarians, it was officially announced today.
