### Official Canvass of Votes

The votes cast in the late unpleasantness in Josephine county are now being canvassed, though the results of none of the contests were so close that the official canvass can make any change in the results. The vote for president was canvassed this forenoon, the high Hughes elector being found to be eight votes in the lead of the high Wilson elector, though the two high Wilson electors were higher than the two low men on the Hughes ticket. Mr. Butler was high on the republican ticket, while Mr. Haney had that distinction on the democratic ticket. The vote cast for the Hughes electors was as follows: 1,664, 1,660, 1,656, 1,651, 1,648. For Wilson electors: 1,656, 1,656, 1,650, 1,648, 1,646.

### Illahee Residence Burned

Sunday afternoon the large two-story residence of U. L. Upson, on Bridge street, better known as Illahee poultry farm, caught fire from a defective flue. The fire alarm was immediately turned in and the fire department rushed to the scene at a speed that broke all fire department speed records in the city. The residence was a few feet outside the city limits and the fire department hose was not quite long enough to reach, so the members of the department and other residents formed a bucket brigade, but the house was so far gone that the heat drove the men from the roof. When it was seen the house could not be saved, the men began carrying out the household effects. When they were all out the doors were taken from their hinges and windows taken from the frames and carried to a safe distance. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

### TRAMP STEAMERS AND LINERS REQUISITIONED

Galveston, Nov. 13.—The British admiralty has requisitioned all liners and tramp steamers in the gulf and Atlantic trade flying the British flag, by ordering all steamers to carry 50 per cent grain cargo, according to advices received here today.

The new grain requirement, together with the metals requirements already in force, will practically load ships to their marks, making it impossible to carry cotton or a general cargo. Heretofore, British ships have been required to carry one-third grain. All British tonnage here has been withdrawn from the market and the order is understood to extend to vessels from all United States ports.

### TACOMA BAKERS RAISE PRICE OF BREAD AND BUNS

Tacoma, Nov. 13.—The 15 cent loaf of bread made its appearance in Tacoma today, and at the same time the popular five cent loaf has gone to that bourne from which it will never return, bakers say. Housewives hereafter will have to pay 10 cents for a loaf but slightly larger than the displaced Jitney portion. Beginning today, also buns and rolls are boosted five cents a dozen, to 15 cents.

These advances were agreed upon by the local bakers Sunday. The reasons assigned for the higher prices is the general raise in the materials used, especially lard and flour.

### GERMAN WARSHIPS SHELL FINNISH COAST

Petrograd, Nov. 13.—German naval forces bombarded the Finnish coast Friday under cover of a fog, it was officially admitted today. The statement said a number of vessels had been sunk.  
The vessels sunk were part of the bombarding ships, the report stated. The German vessels were 36-knot torpedo boats, the war office stated.
