COOS BAY MEN WILL FARM IN OLD MEXICO

Chas. Cavanagh returned Monday from Sonora, Mexico, where he and Mr. Coffelt recently made heavy purchases in Mexican farm lands and intend to get into the wheat raising business on an extensive scale.

Mr. Cavanagh says that the land is 2300 feet above sea level, the S. P. railroad passes near his farms, the nearby cities afford excellent markets and have modern flouring mills, the rainfall is 16 inches for the year and the rainy season is during July and August.

It is Mr. Cavanagh's plan to go there with his sons early this fall, plow up his place with a tractor, and plant as much as possible to wheat.

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DEADLY TYPHUS WORKS WHILE NATIONS FIGHT

London, July 2.—"In the condition of chaos in which Eastern Europe is at present, famine and fatigue have produced a condition of lowered resistance to infection which favors the reproduction of the epidemics of the Middle Ages," says a writer in the Lausanne (Switzerland) Gazette.

"Prisoners are wandering in Eastern Europe on their way to their homes, innumerable Russians on their way to the East from Germany, Germans, Austrians and Hungarians passing from Russia to the West, Serbs and Croats striking South, Poles going to the North, crossing one another in indescribable confusion in Poland, the Ukraine, and Hungary.

"The fight against typhus consists mainly in bathing the men and sterilizing their clothing. The Hungarians possess ovens, but no coal; the Czech-Slovaks have coal but no ovens. Soap and body linen are absent everywhere. Linen, when put into the oven is so wretched as to be unwearable afterwards and the owner has to be sent away clad in his sheepskin.

"The ordinary mortality of exanthematous typhus in epidemic regions before the war in Silesia, Poland, Russia and Galicia was from 6 to 7 per cent, at present it is over 20 per cent. It is true that the epidemic has not yet assumed the proportions of epidemic cholera in India, where in the town of Bombay alone there were 2,295 deaths from January 12 to 25, 1919; but there is a great danger for Europe. All Eastern European states realize this and though they were at war with one another, yet they sent their delegates to the Budapest congress and decided to place their resources in common."

age of the Austro-Hungarians. He assured the king that the people of Transylvania were as one in their devotion and loyalty to him and that they all hailed the day of their liberation from the foreign oppressor and their unity with their brother Rumanians.

King Ferdinand was deeply touched at the cordiality of the receptions everywhere along the route. To the Associated Press correspondent he said:

"It is a source of great happiness to me and to the queen to find ourselves in the minds of the Rumanian people of Transylvania and the Banat who have long waited for this great hour of their liberation and of their national unity. All of the emotion and enthusiasm with which they received the first sovereign of all the Rumanians not only is the best recompense for all of our struggles and sufferings but also a guarantee of the link which in the Great Rumania will bind together the people and the dynasty. I do not doubt that the peace conference will ratify the right of my people to a complete unity."

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

It is unlawful to burn slashing, wood slash or grass on or near forest or brush covered lands, from June 1st to October 1st, or to operate any locomotive, logging engine, portable engine, traction engine or stationary engine using fuel other than oil, which is not provided with an adequate spark arrester.

Nearly every year farm houses, barns and fences, are destroyed by brush fires in Josephine county, and taxable property is thus removed from the tax roll, so that the county loses by these brush fires, as well as the individual whose property is destroyed.

Our forests give employment to many laboring men in the state and even here in Josephine county many small sawmills are operating. If our timber is burned up, this industry will be killed. We therefore ask the public to cooperate with us in preventing fires. Put out all fires just starting if you can, notify your local warden, C. A. Hoxie, phone 312-Y, or Lynn P. Sabin, phone 346 or 107-J, of all fires you can't put out yourself.
