LAKE TAHOE WILL LURE MANY AUTO TOURISTS

Sacramento, Cal., July 7.—A free camping ground on the shore of Lake Tahoe in the Sierra Nevada mountains, being prepared by the state, will be ready for use by the public before July 15. It was announced today by George Neale, deputy fish and game commissioner for the northern district of California. Camping sites that will accommodate 83 parties at one time, have been laid out on the site of the old state fish hatchery, a short distance from Tahoe City.

Drinking fountains have been installed and water will be accessible to each lot for cooking purposes. Before next summer the commission hopes to have shower baths installed for the convenience of the campers. A platform for bathers has been built on the edge of the lake. A complete sewage system and a garbage incinerator have been installed.

ALASKANS ASK FOR LOWER STEAMER RATES

Juneau, Alaska, July 8.—Alaska gradually will lose population and revert to a vast territory unpeopled save for the seasonal fishing population and operatives of a few great mines, if lower steamship rates from the outside world cannot be obtained. Governor Thomas Riggs, Jr., declared in a message to the last Alaska territorial legislature here.

The governor's message advocated the consideration of the establishment of a territorially owned passenger and freight steamship line to compete with the privately owned lines which operate from Seattle. A line owned by the territory could operate for lower rates, the governor argued.

"I realize that I am advocating a most radical and startling departure from accepted standards," the governor's message said. "The first impulse is to characterize the scheme as impracticable. It is not impracticable; it is distinctly practicable and will allow the territory to take on renewed life."

"Every other question sinks to insignificance, for back of it all remains the basic fact that unless relief is afforded us in our most vital need, monies expended on roads, schools, charities and all other constructive projects constitute merely stop-gap measure, never to bear fruit."

Ocean lanes, it was pointed out, are the only routes Alaska has to the outside world and if the lanes are blocked by high prohibitive rates Alaska will not prosper.

YOUNG FRENCH SOLDIER FAILED TO BLUFF GUARD

Geneva, July 8.—A French soldier aged 24, who has been at the front since 1914, and won the war cross, presented himself to the French guard at Neuchatel on the Swiss frontier and said that he must visit his fiancée in Switzerland whom he had not seen for three years. When the guard said that it was impossible to let him pass, the soldier declared, "I am going even if you shot me. I must see her." As he crossed the frontier, the guard fired and the soldier fell dead.

Ink Stains on Furniture.

To remove ink stains from mahogany, rosewood or black walnut furniture, put half a dozen drops of spirits of niter in a spoonful of water and touch the stain with a feather wet with the mixture. As soon as the stain disappears, rub with a cloth dampened with cold water.

KOREANS DETERMINED TO BE FREE FROM JAPS

Seoul, Korea, July 8.—Five Koreans who were arrested on the charge of leading a new independence riot in the streets of Seoul recently tried to commit suicide but were prevented by the police. One of the men, Yi Hatsu, is 71 years of age, and is said to be the father of one of the Korean leaders now in Paris. Another, An Tal-shyun, is declared to be the uncle of the assassin of Prince Ito who was shot at Harbin in 1909.

Anti Japanese propaganda continues to circulate in Korea.

POISON CAMPAIGN TO KILL COYOTES

Why not more sheep and goats? The principal reason is the coyote. Josephine county should today have 10 of these animals where she has only one, and this is putting it very mild too.

It goes without argument that this class of livestock will thrive on our hills and waste places with less care and shelter than any other stock except for the loss from the coyote.

Concerted action on the part of the farmers will reduce this loss to a minimum. The loss from the coyote is not confined to sheep and goats, but goes on to poultry and pigs, and in this county runs into thousands of dollars annually. A poisoning campaign is to be put on beginning July 15th and continue for one week, and every one is expected to cooperate in this campaign. Keep your sheep, goats, pigs and poultry where the coyote can not get them. Keep your dogs and cats shut up so they cannot get the bait. Not only for the sake of the dogs and cats, but so as to leave the baits for the coyotes.

Are we going to give up to this pest and allow it to put us out of business?

The fruit grower has his grievances to contend with. He must fight pests all the time.

Turkey raising was becoming an important industry in the county, and was flourishing until the coyote got so bad. One farmer lost 42 turkeys in one night from coyotes.

Give this campaign a careful consideration—cooperation.


