## TRADE WITH MEXICANS BIG ITEM IN ARIZONA

Douglas, Ariz., Sept. 15.—Passport regulations of the United States which prevent hundreds of Mexicans in Sonora from crossing to this side of the international line to do their trading have caused considerable complaints among the merchants of Arizona border towns who have heretofore reaped a harvest from Mexican patronage.

The Mexican shoppers often presented some peculiar contracts. Formerly many Mexican families, their nakedness barely covered by the rags they wore but with thousands of dollars in their purses, crossed the border for their annual buying trip.

After a day or two they would re-cross to the Mexican side, members of the family wearing as much of their clothing purchased as possible in order to escape Mexican import duties. Some times a man would be seen wearing several suits of clothing with four or five hats, one upon the other, on his head. Such sights, once common, are rarely observed now.
