ducts this fall to advertise us in the east and it would be well to have a number of farmers meet him and hear what he desires in this respect.

In fact this seems to be the particular object of Mr. Hill's visit to the interior at this time. He intends to advertise the great unsettled sections of Oregon and on this trip will gather data for that purpose.

"We are planning a very elaborate campaign," said Mr. Hill. "The people in the east are deeply interested in Oregon. They want to know all about it and its resources."

"Of course, Oregon people can't believe this awakening is coming, but it is. There is more commotion over Oregon down east than right here in Portland. I suppose the people here have been on the threshold so many times that they are a little skeptical. But this time we are going to do things and the publicity campaign that will be launched by the Great Northern is expected to be the greatest and most systematic ever launched."

"In the first place we will get together as complete an exhibit of Oregon products as can be gathered by men expert in their lines. Then it will be placed in a specially constructed car and toured throughout the eastern and middle states all next winter. It will start out in the fall. The people we want to interest have no time to view our exhibits or hear lectures in the summer time when they are engaged with their crops."

"The car will be followed by descriptive literature, and then information bureaus, completely equipped in every respect, will be established in the larger centers. Portland will have one. Others will be maintained throughout the country. At these information without coloring will be disseminated to those seeking it, and there will be thousands upon thousands of inquiries."

"Of that we feel certain, because we know what these publicity campaigns have accomplished for other states, and we know that Oregon appeals stronger to the people of the east and the middle states than any other section. Somehow they like the name Oregon, they have heard of its climate and its wonderful resources and opportunities."

"We have carried on and are continuing a campaign for Montana. Thousands upon thousands of acres of Government land have been settled during the past year."

"The party is in Crook county today and it is impossible to get in touch with them but they are expected to arrive here tomorrow evening—Monday morning at the latest."

"It is hoped that business may be so arranged as to make it possible for all to meet with these gentlemen and give them an enthusiastic welcome to the

Harney country and make them know that we want them to come with the railroad.

President Leonard of the Commercial Club has appointed Wm. Farre, G. A. Rembold, Sam Mothershead, J. J. Donegan, L. M. Brown, J. L. Gault and J. M. Dalton a committee on statistics and although the time is short they will have a more or less complete report of the resources of this big section in readiness if Mr. Hill should want it.

Information has reached here this morning that the St. Paul capitalists who recently negotiated for the Road Land Grant will join the Hill party in the eastern part of the state—possibly here—and that as soon as Mr. Burdard, who is reported Mr. Hill's high-hand man in the colonization schemes of all his railroads, reaches Ontario, the final transfer of the grant will be made.

The Times-Herald would ask the people of Burns to make it their business to do everything possible toward assisting this party in gaining all information possible. Suspend business for the time and help as a committee of the whole to impress Mr. Hill with the fact that we welcome the Great Empire Builder to the Great Harney Country and are ready to do our part toward his railroad.

SILVER CREEK IRRIGATION

CAPITALISTS MAKE APPLICATION FOR WITHDRAWAL OF LAND.

A Carey Act Segregation of Merit That Will Likely be Taken up—Men On Ground Making Preliminary Surveys.

Emory Cole, Leonard Cole and C. B. McConnell have taken Engineers A. O. Faulkner, C. E. Beery and a crew of assistants out to Silver Creek to make a preliminary survey of the Silver Creek irrigation project with a view of taking the proposition up and reclaiming a large area of fine land. These gentlemen had investigated the possibilities of this irrigation scheme before and were so favorably impressed that they have asked the state for a withdrawal under the Carey Act and the application has the approval of State Engineer John Lewis. While this doesn't mean the project is a certainty, it does indicate that if the land can be irrigated at a reasonable cost and the present water owners will give assistance in the way of an equitable adjustment of their rights, the scheme will be put through.

This project has long been favorably considered by irrigatologists and it has been left to this time only on account of its isolation. Now with the certainty of transportation and the finding of a great amount of material necessary to construct the big reservoir within easy distance it looks most favorable.

The gentlemen are all out with the engineers at this time but it is hoped soon to have definite announcement from them.
