INTER CHURCH WORLD MOVEMENT

(Report by Rev. B. S. Hughes) - Rev. B. S. Hughes, the only protestant pastor in an area of 10,600 square miles, represented Harney county at a gathering of pastors of this state in the conference held at Portland last week.

The world's survey put on in Portland last week by a team of five workers selected from the first conference at Atlantic City January 7-10, 1929. While this conference was going on there were eleven others of the same kind being carried on in other parts of the United States. There are thirty denominations co-operating for world wide extension of religious effort.

There were almost five hundred pastors of the protestant churches of Oregon in attendance at this conference. This survey carried us into the remotest bounds of the earth. First we studied the needs of the foreign field—religiously, educationally, industrially.

Following the needs of the foreign field we sat in silence and studied the needs of the home field, comprising the United States, Alaska, Hawaii and the West Indies. We studied: The religious needs at home; educational needs, industrial needs. We studied our own state needs with every county before us.

The plan is to carry this survey with a team of from six to eight workers into every county seat town. This team will bring with them a lantern and slides and throw on the screen the pictures of both foreign and home scenes to move us in our activity for God's Kingdom and His Church.

A fuller report will be given Sunday morning at 11 o'clock by the pastor in the Presbyterian church.
