KNIGHTS AT DENVER.

GREATEST GATHERING IN THE ORDER'S HISTORY.

At Least Eighty Thousand Members Attend the Twenty-fifth Triennial Conclave—Denver Made Great Preparations for the Event.

Templars in Conclave. The twenty-fifth triennial conclave of the Knights Templars, which opened in Denver on Tuesday last, marks a new era in the history of the order. This has been the most memorable gathering the order has ever known. Over 150,000 visitors are in attendance, and nearly a quarter of a million dollars has been spent in preparations and entertainment. For almost three years Coloradoans have been preparing for the event, and, according to the dispatches, never in her history was Denver so beautiful and in such gala attire. The national flag, the banners of the Knights, bunting and thousands of the emblems of the cross and crown float everywhere. Many miles of streets have strings of incandescent lights at the crossings. These lights, glowing with their brilliant colors of the Knights Templars and national flags, mingled with the private electric display of merchants and professional men, make Denver seem almost like fairy land at night. From the tops of nine-storied buildings great search lights of many thousand candle power will illuminate the city with almost the brightness of day.

The Knights Templars have practically taken Denver and the city surrendered unconditionally. The lowest estimate places the number of visiting Knights at 50,000, accompanied by about 18,000 ladies.

The Knights Templars conclave have held every three years for over half a century, principally for the election of a governing body and an exchange of opinions which might be beneficial to the order. The first encampment held in this country was in New York, June 20, 1816. The attendance was less than three hundred. Since then conclaves have been held as follows: New York, Sept. 16, 1819; New York Sept. 18,

1826; New York, Sept. 14, 1829; Baltimore, Nov. 21, 1832; Washington, D. C., Dec. 7, 1835; Boston, Sept. 12, 1838; New York, Sept. 14, 1841; New Haven, Sept. 10, 1844; Columbus, O., Sept. 14, 1847; Boston, Sept. 10, 1850; Lexington, Ky., Sept. 13, 1853; Hartford, Sept. 9, 1856; Chicago, Sept. 13, 1859; New York, Sept. 2, 1862; Columbus, O., Sept. 5, 1865; St. Louis, Sept. 15, 1868; Baltimore, Sept. 19, 1871; New Orleans, Dec. 1, 1874; Cleveland, Aug. 28, 1877; Chicago, Aug. 17, 1880; San Francisco, Aug. 21, 1883; St. Louis, Sept. 21, 1886; Washington, D. C., Oct. 8, 1889; and Denver, Aug. 9, 1892.

According to latest statistics in 1870 there were in the United States 25,844 Knights; in 1880, 50,681; in 1890, 84,923, while last year the census showed 88,954. It will be noticed that in 31 years there was an increase from 25,844 members to 88,954.

The grand parade and review of the Knights Templars was an imposing affair, and it is calculated that at least 45,000 Knights participated. From early morning preparations had been going on for the big event, and the streets were crowded with people seeking position on the numerous stands along the line of march. The handling of the Knights was accomplished with considerable dexterity. The separate divisions were formed on side streets, and the arrangements were so perfect that every division moved into the line in excellent order. All along the line the people crowded so as to form an unbroken line three miles in length, and there could not have been less than 200,000 people viewing the magnificent pageant. One hundred and fourteen military bands furnished music for this great procession.

A Masonic Temple of Logs. The first Masonic temple in Denver, and also said to be the first in Colorado, was the old log cabin of W. G. Russell on what was then known as Ferry street. The date is usually placed in the year 1859, but the first meeting was held in this cabin, according to the statement of Andrew Sargentoff, in December, 1858. Mr. Sargentoff was born in Columbia County, New York, Aug. 26, 1828, moved to Nebraska in 1854, and in 1858 following the gold rush to Pike's Peak. Among those present at the first meeting in this old log cabin "Masonic temple" were Mr. Sargentoff, Judge W. M. Slaughter, Henry Allen, James Winchester, W. G. Russell, Robert T. Willis, J. D. Ramage, Dr. L. J. Russell, O. E. Lehov, Oliver Russell, C. H. Blake, and Samuel Bates. Instead of the old cabin of Russell, where the Masons used to meet in 1858-59, the order now has a magnificent temple at the corner of 16th and Welton streets, Denver. The building lots and furniture have a value of about \$600,000—a remarkable contrast to the cabin of pioneer days. This temple has been erected since Denver was selected as the place for the present conclave.

LION OF ST. MARK.

The Famous Venetian Symbol Restored and Replaced on its Column.

The symbol of the Venetian republic—the famous lion of St. Mark—which, after being restored, has been replaced on its column in the Piazzetta in Venice, is made of bronze. There is a tradition among the Venetian people that its eyes are diamonds, but they are really white agates faceted. Its mane is most elaborately wrought, and its retracted gaping mouth and its fierce mustaches give it an oriental aspect. The creature as it now stands belongs to many different epochs, varying from some date previous to our era down to this century. It is conjectured that it may have originally formed a part of the decoration of some Assyrian palace. St. Mark's lion certainly was not originally, for it was made to stand level upon the ground, and had to be raised up in front to allow the evangel to be slipped under its forepaws. Last year the granite column on which the lion stood was seriously off plumb, and the authorities decided on its rectification. The work was entrusted to Signor Vendrasco, who, by passing a copper bar through the axis of the shaft and by balancing the whole shaft upon the rod, compelled it to return to the perpendicular. The work was attended with no little danger and difficulty, but within three days was entirely successful.

The Mace. Like the British house of commons, the lower house of the United States congress at Washington possesses a symbol of its authority in the form of a mace. It looks like the fasces which were borne by the lictors before the Roman tribunes and consuls, and consists of a bundle of thirteen ebony rods entwined and bound together with silver bands. The thirteen ebony sticks represent the thirteen original states of the union. They are surmounted by a globe of silver, upon which the hemispheres are traced, while a silver eagle with outstretched wings is perched upon the summit of the globe. It was made in 1834, weighs twenty pounds, and is entrusted to the custody of the sergeant-at-arms.

Washington Diplomats. The diplomatic gentlemen of Washington lead a rather gay life, says a correspondent. Not one in a dozen of them ever did a real day's work. The young attaches and secretaries are for the most part the sons of rich or influential fathers, appointed for their family's sake rather than for any ability which they are supposed to possess, and they spend nearly all their time playing tennis, riding or driving and dining one with another. I asked an attaché of one of the big European legations what his duties were, and he replied: "Well, I have to open the mail every day"—he explained that the mail usually consisted of five or six letters and occasionally a diplomatic packet—and I must dine three times a week with my minister and go to church with him every Sunday. I believe that is all."

An Improved Substitute for Tea. A new industry has sprung up in England in the manufacture of hop tea. Hop tea is a blend of Indian and Ceylon teas with Kenish hops, prepared by a special drying process, in which the hops come in contact with pure air only and are not subjected to the fumes of which brewers' hops are exposed. It is claimed for hop tea that the introduction of the hops not only improves the flavor of the tea by giving it a malty aroma, but the sedative in the hop counteracts the exciting effect of ordinary tea upon the nerves. It is also claimed that the tonic property of the hop tea cures and diminishes the stringency of ordinary tea.

He speaks and writes very good English. A reporter called upon him recently, and, after much persuasion, succeeded in getting his history. He has been in Augusta only a short while, and is doing a grocery business at the place mentioned. He came there from Beaufort, S. C. He says he left China when a boy and went to Ireland, where he lived a good many years. The Irish brogue still sticks to him. While in Dublin, Ireland, he married an Irish woman named Mary Foley. From Ireland he came to America, and since has traveled all over the world, having been a steward in the navy for several years, and a steward on a merchantman for fifteen years. After passing through many vicissitudes he has taken up his abode in Augusta. He has been married nineteen years and has two little children. The young shoots of the cane, when they first push through the ground, are covered with fine, brownish hairs, which, under the microscope, appear to be bayonet-like spikes of crystals of silica, infinitely sharp and hollow. Small quantities of these hairs administered daily in the food bring on ulceration of the whole alimentary canal, simulating malignant dysentery, which eventually causes death.
