Black Hills College.

The second annual catalogue for the Black Hills college is being distributed. The term begins Tuesday, Sept. 20th. The catalogue says "the importance of being present at the very beginning can scarcely be over-estimated. A few days delay at the start often effects the work of the student throughout the term. The College has five courses of study. Classical, Scientific, Philosophical, Literary and Music, leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Philosophy, Bachelor of Literature and Bachelor of Music. Each of these courses is four years in length and each of the literary courses is preceded by an Academic course of three years. The music course has an Academic course of two years. Preparatory to the Academic course, is a one year's course of study in the ordinary English branches. The amount of work required in the college courses of study, will be fully equal to that required by other leading colleges. In the arrangement of the courses of study, the purpose has been to serve the highest interests of the student. The completion of any course will require hard study, but it is believed will secure the result desired, thorough fitness for the undertakings of every day life."

The Ladies College Society will hold its regular meeting at the college on Friday, Aug. 19th, at four o'clock p. m. All members as well as any others interested in our college are requested to be present.

Two Fatal Accidents.

At Deadwood yesterday afternoon three boys, Bobbie Bennett, Leo Mel-drum and Chas. Armstrong went hunting four miles from the city. Two had rifles and the third a shot gun. The boy who had the gun accidentally discharged the contents into the abdomen of little Bobbie Bennett, who fell immediately. The other two started at once for Dead-wood, one fainting from fright on the way. The third kept on to town where he told the parents, who, in company with Dr. Paddock started for the scene of the accident. The injured boy who was a son of Judge Bennett, lived only twenty minutes after the arrival of his parents and the physician. He was conscious to the last.

Rev. G. G. Ware was telephoned for to leave by this morning's train to conduct the funeral services, which took place this afternoon at four o'clock.

At Hill City yesterday while Dodd, the butcher, was driving some cattle he had purchased, to town, he was thrown from his horse, alighting on his head. He sustained a fracture of the skull, from the effects of which he died last night at 10 o'clock.—Rapid City Republican.
