Hill City Fire.
On Thursday morning at 4 o'clock fire broke out in Hill City, and before it could be controlled destroyed Canfield's drug store, over which was the Masonic hall, Crane's grocery store, Shoemaker's hall, Mills' restaurant, Hopkins and Tighe's furniture store, and other buildings were torn down to prevent the spread of the flames. Altogether nine buildings were destroyed. A man named Cunningham lost his life by the fire, and it is supposed he was the cause of the fire, as he went to bed late badly intoxicated.

Another Turn in the Water Works Wheel.
At their meeting Wednesday the city council took up a new water works franchise, and it passed its first reading. It is to the Hot Springs Improvement Co. The franchise is the same as has passed one reading before, to F. T. Evans, Jr. Who the Hot Springs Improvement Co. consists of is not generally known. It will be seen by the proceedings that the committee appointed to look into the matter reported that the city could bond for \$14,000 for water works, but of course the council did not wish the city to have the franchise—and the city will therefore not get it, whatever may be public sentiment.

The apportionment of jurors for next term of court was then drawn.
Moved to adjourn to Saturday, Oct. 22, at 9 o'clock a. m. Carried.
