ANNUAL CONVENTION

Brief Sketch of the Christian Endeavor Movement Which Meets at Aberdeen

The twenty-fifth annual convention of the South Dakota Christian Endeavor Union which is to be held at Aberdeen on June 22, 23, 24 and 25, will again emphasize the wonderful growth of this movement all over the face of the globe within the past thirty five years.

Thirty-five years ago last February, feeling the need of a young people's religious organization, Rev. Dr. Francis E. Clark founded the first Christian Endeavor society in the city of Portland, Maine. Through great perseverance he founded other societies until his work has influenced the entire world.

At present there are more than 8,000 Christian Endeavor societies composed of 4,000,000 members of seventy-five different denominations and 125 languages. These organizations have been established in all the counties of the world until all races and nationalities are engaged in its activities.

At the international convention held in Chicago last July, there were 25,000 delegates in attendance from all parts of the world. The meetings were conducted in the Coliseum, the largest auditorium in the city.

Here Dr. Clark, the founder, outlined a plan of work for the next two years which was unanimously adopted. The plan is this: To win a million new Endeavorers, a million new converts, an equal number of members of the Peace Union, a million new dollars for missions, ten thousand new societies, twenty thousand new Comrades of the Quiet Hour, ten thousand new Legionaries, the same number of C. E. Experts and five thousand new life work recruits. This is a tremendous task to be accomplished before 1917 and South Dakota has been given her share of the work. The Aberdeen convention will spur the South Dakota young people on to accomplish all that has been assigned to this state in this big movement.

The Aberdeen convention committee is working hard on its plans to show the delegates a good time. They are planning on at least one representative from every Christian Endeavor Society in the state and all churches that have no organizations are urged to send delegates to the conference so as to stimulate the growth of new societies where needed.

GETTING RESULTS

Work of Commercial Club Secretaries Beginning to Show

Results of the cooperative work of the secretaries of the association of the Black Hills commercial clubs are beginning to show. During the spring the various secretaries have been lining up and getting ready for publication the sixteen page folder and the two pages of plate matter and both are now in the hands of the printer and will be ready for distribution within a short time.

The folders are replete with information which outsiders interested in the Black Hills will most want to have and will be profusely illustrated with views of different sections of the Hills. There will be 10,000 of these folders.

The plate matter will also be illustrated and there is from a column to a column and a half of descriptive matter of the opportunities and resources of each of the ten communities in the association. This will be sent to fifty newspapers in eastern South Dakota and will be run by them in sections during the summer. It is going principally to those sections of the state most thickly populated.

County Agent Lyman, of Spearfish, at the instance of the association, is now engaged on a tour of the principal cities in eastern South Dakota lecturing on the beauties and resources of the Black Hills district and to illustrate his talks is using highly colored slides in the motion picture houses. He is drawing big audiences everywhere as he is extensively advertised before hand.


