News Brevities.

An ex clergyman and botanic physician, by the name of Piza, residing in Stove, Va., being charged with the offense of having carelessly communicated the small-pox in that town, was taken by some of the citizens to a tavern, where they forced him to drink liquor, after which they shut him up in a smoke house and smoked him with burning leather shavings.

Letters recently received from Zante, Ionian Island, dated Dec. 29, 1856, state that there had been a good crop of oranges, thanks to the remedy which had been discovered for the blight, which the vines had been afflicted for three or four seasons past.

We have just heard of one the noblest deeds of humanity that has ever been noted to record. Peter Falcon, of Calabas, during the late terrible storm, saved the lives of eleven shipwrecked canoe. Although strongly urged not to leave the shore, Peter Falcon fastened life preservers to his knees and went on his hands and knees on the ice upwards of a quarter of a mile to the barque New Empire and ship Calabas, wrecked on the coast, and rescued the lives of eleven men. All honor to Peter Falcon, so says the Boston Ledger.

The Augusta (Ga.) Chronicle of last Monday says: "About 11 o'clock Saturday night, the first floor of the store No. 6 'Warren Block,' which was occupied by Lewis & Allen, for storage and on which they had 15,000 bushels of wheat stored, gave way and precipitated the wheat, with the two upper floors and part of the roof, into the cellar. The loss to Mr. Marcell, the owner of the store, will not probably be less than \$5,000. The grain will be saved with trifling loss."

The Rockingham Register learns from the most reliable authority, that the shock of an earthquake was felt in Pendleton Co., Va., some days ago, and that an aperture had been formed in the mountain, which two or three miles of Greenville, is that county, from which volumes of black smoke are issuing, and large stones have been thrown to a great height.

A genuine "Washington Eagle" was killed on Monday last, near Augusta, Georgia, by Mr. Carlos Delage. The bird was of immense size measuring from tip to tip, seven feet. Its bill and talons proved that it was of great age. Dr. Barker, of Augusta, intends to stuff and preserve it as a specimen.

He is said to be an abolitionist, and blinds his purpose by assuming a respectable vocation. The citizens of Fair Bluff, N. C., gave him orders to leave.

Emigration from Europe is likely to flow in upon us next season in a largely increased volume. The newspapers of Ireland chronicle the continuance of the exodus from that country with feelings of sadness and surprise. They had supposed that the improved condition of Ireland, the rise in the wages of labor, and other things would have put an end to the flight. But the Celtic race steadily pour into the great packet ships, and cross the waves, to join their kindred on the promised land. Though we hear less of the German emigrants, yet they are in reality greater, for, at the statistics of the last few years show, the influx of German emigrants yearly in an increasing ratio over the Irish. There has not been a steady rise in the English emigration, though not as yet to a sufficient extent to have attracted much attention. It is possible, though by no means certain, that in a few years we shall have a large English migration to the United States. Our country is exceedingly prosperous at present, and with her wide-stretching Western territories open to settlement, she can accommodate all who may come to us.

The Boston Herald is informed that about two years ago Mr. James Thomas, of Gloucester, with his wife, was on a visit to West Gloucester. When about to leave for home they missed the train of cars, and started to walk home. The nearest way was across the rail road bridge, a quarter of a mile long, over the Canal river. The bridge was not planked, and is about fifty feet above the water. So great was the effect of the excitement caused by this dangerous feat that Mrs. Thomas, who was in good health previously, has been in poor health ever since, and during the time that she has interfered has not spoken a word. This case has attracted the attention of the medical profession of that town.

A late number of the Galveston Citizen says: "We have on various occasions analyzed cases of the trade in Texas cattle, horses and mules, with Missouri, was growing into importance. Last spring a friend of ours drove 150 horses and mules from south-west Texas to Missouri and sold them. On Tuesday last he again passed through this city with fifteen thousand to invest in another drove. In all, he has driven cattle through four or five different springs."

The London Times of a late date remarks as follows: "The time honored phrase of 'poor Ireland' may be considered as representing something which has now ceased to exist. A Higher Law.

We notice that some of our eastern exchanges are denouncing the Philadelphia jury which recently acquitted Sherlock who was put upon trial for killing Phillip Clagges. The circumstances which led to the killing are briefly these: Sherlock who was a clerk in Clagges's store, had a handsome wife to whom he introduced his employer. The latter under the garb of friendship ingratiated himself into her favor and sought to accomplish her ruin by slandering her husband. Failing by this means in his object, he effected it by giving her drugged wine. The humiliated woman informed her husband of the outrage upon his honor and her chastity, and he immediately sought the guilty scoundrel and killed him. What ever may be the code of morality, we contend that nothing but justice was administered to Clagges. Death should be the penalty of seduction; if the law does not provide it, public opinion should. The Philadelphia jury did right in yielding to the decree of this higher law. Until men, the law-makers, are governed by a purer morality, and juster conceptions of what is due to woman, we cannot expect them to throw around her such protection against the wiles of the seducer as are due to her. But, we do not doubt that the time will come when juster and nobler views will govern the law-maker, and ample protection be afforded her. Until that day comes, let the law of public opinion be death to the seducer, by the hand of the injured husband, father, or brother.

Mr. Buchanan and Forney.

Since our republication of the Forney, Roberts letter proposing the pumping of Jamieson, the actor, with a view to aid Forrest in his attempt to cast his wife away, we have heard it doubted whether Mr. Buchanan could really have desired Forney's election to the U. S. Senate. We must confess that it required some credit to attach any great faith to the charge; but proof has now been given which places the matter beyond controversy, and presents Mr. Buchanan to the country as an intriguer for the election of Forney, with whom, it appears, he holds intimate and confidential relations. One of the democratic members of the Pennsylvania Legislature, a Mr. Waggenesser, who voted against Forney, recently made a speech in vindication of himself and those who voted with him. In the course of his speech, he produced the following letter from Mr. Buchanan, which produced quite a sensation: "WHATLARD, Jan. 7, 1857. My Dear Sir: Although I am always refrained from interfering in the choice of Senators by the Legislature, yet the highly confidential relations which a Pennsylvania President ought to sustain toward a Pennsylvania Senator at the present moment induces me to say a few words to you as a friend friend of the pending Senatorial election. I fear that doubts have been expressed as to my preference among the candidates, and, although my opinion may be entitled to little weight, I do not desire to be placed in an equivocal position on this or any other subject. When asked, I have always said I preferred Col. Forney, and I should esteem it a friendly act towards myself for any person in or out of the Legislature to support him. At the same time, I desire to express my warm personal and political regard for Messrs. Robbins, Foster, Buckalew, and Wright. From the course pursued by Mr. Brodhead for some years past, confidential relations between him and myself have ceased. I have thus presented you my views, so that, if you should deem it necessary, you may so state my sentiments to such persons as may consider them of value. From your friend, very respectfully, JAMES BUCHANAN."

This letter settles the question. Mr. Buchanan did attempt to induce the Legislature of Pennsylvania to send Forney to the Senate.
