

A WONDERFUL TREE.

Tropical Palm Growing in Brazil That Supplies Nearly all of Man's Necessities.

Nature does some wonderful things in the tropics towards supporting a population rendered lazy by her climatic moods in those regions. For example, there is a carnauba palm growing in Brazil which yields a nutritious milk from which flour is made. The same tree produces edible nuts from which a fair imitation of coffee may be extracted; its roots have medicinal properties; its palmetto is eaten as a vegetable; yields a sugar and a sago, both very nutritious, and from it wine and vinegar are produced; the stem contains a pith which can be used for cork, is covered with a straw that is woven into hats, baskets, brooms and mats; the wood of the stem is used in the manufacture of musical instruments, for building material or ground up for paper and cloth; with the pith punched out it becomes available for pump stock and tubes. And finally, this wonderful tree gives up a resinous wax much used for making fine candles.

The carnauba tree is naturally highly prized in Brazil, since it supplies about all of man's necessities. But what additional value it would have if it could be grown in this temperate zone, where humanity has been taught by necessity to hustle for subsistence. If the carnauba could be grown by the North American farmer there would be a vast amount of surplus energy to be turned into other avenues or wasted. Nature is a wise distributor.—Pittsburg Dispatch.

ZERO WEATHER IN ARKANSAS.

The Potatoe, Cotton and Lumber Market on a Boom.

LUXORA, ARK., Feb. 18 1900.

Yesterday was the coldest day we have had here this winter, the mercury registering at zero; but this afternoon the weather is moderating considerably, and the "beautiful" is melting away.

January was truly a lovely winter month, and the farmers took advantage of it by preparing as much land as they could, and when the present cold snap came they all were about ready to begin planting potatoes, and a few had planted several acres. Mr. W. A. Johnson, "the potato king," is ahead. Last year when everyone else here almost failed entirely, he made a fine crop, averaging 35 barrels per acre. I wrote up his crop in a letter to the HERALD just after it was gathered, but by some means the letter was never received.

The farmers are very much encouraged by the rise in cotton, and a much larger acreage will be planted this year than for several years past. Mr. A. J. Barber has already profited by the rise, by having 54 bales stored in Memphis, which he sold last week for 9 cents per pound. Lumber has gone up too, and it seems that the saw mills have hardly made a beginning in our vast forests. The best lumber is now selling at \$20 a thousand feet, delivered on the bank of the river; fairly good, at \$16.

An uncommonly large barge left Crenshaw's Landing a few days ago for Cairo, Ill. It contained seven million feet of lumber.

The roads have been so dry this winter that the farmers have made nice profits on their teams, by hauling lumber.

We now have close connection with Memphis by rail, as we have two trains going there and back each day. Our sister, Miss Hay Davis, left Columbia, Tenn., at 5 o'clock a. m. and arrived here at 9 the following night, making the trip in 16 hours. We enjoyed her visit more than tongue or pen can tell.

We now enjoy the privilege of a daily mail, which is quite an improvement over the old system of thrice weekly by boat. Instead of getting our HERALD on Tuesday as formerly, we now receive it Saturday. This is the first railroad ever run through this county, and it will not be a great while until it will be extended to St. Louis, we are told.

A new and comfortable brick jail is now in course of construction at Osceola, also a large hotel. The latest improvements at Luxora are a 32 room hotel and a depot house.

Last week a Mr. Will A. Smith, better known as "Cow Boy Smith," of Denver, C. L., came here to have a foot race. He proposed to run a ten mile race with ten men, each of them running a mile. The boys beat him six rounds in the opera house. He then walked a five-mile race with them the next night, they walking one half mile each, and he came out a few feet ahead. It is remarkable how well he can run. He says he has run 162 races, of which he has won one hundred and fifty; three of the 12 he has been beaten being in Luxora. He ran his ten miles in 58 minutes. One of the boys made his mile in four minutes.

He offered a pretty silver cup to the first boy in sixteen, who could make the fastest half mile. Van Nicholson won the cup, running it in two minutes and thirty seconds. It was said to be very exciting by those who witnessed it.

Pneumonia has been very prevalent here this winter, but only a few deaths occurred from it.

There has been a good deal of excitement here about smallpox several times, but each time the Doctors pronounced it something else. There have been several who were broken out with something that resembled smallpox but had none of the attending symptoms of that disease, and the eruption disappeared in a day or two, which we are told, is not characteristic of that dreaded disease. Physicians tell us that it is a Cuban disease, the name of which they have not learned. Several have suffered terribly with sore arms, from vaccination, some of which came near having to be amputated.

With the beginning of the New Year, we solemnly resolved to send in a letter to the HERALD often, and haven't we kept that promise true, throughout the month of January we were nursing the sick of our household, and the scenes were very much the same as three years ago; days and nights spent in agony, anxiously watching at the bedside of a precious child, which seemed to be halting between life and death. This little one was permitted to remain with us. To God be all the praise. Kind friends came to our assistance and relieved us as much as was in human power, for which we shall ever feel very grateful.


