

### CENSUS ENUMERATORS.

Appointments for Columbia and the Ninth District.

Col. A. M. Hughes, census supervisor for the Seventh Congressional district, has made the following appointments of census enumerators for Columbia and the Ninth civil district:

NINTH DISTRICT, outside Columbia—John R. Holcomb and L. A. Goslin.

COLUMBIA—First Ward, W. W. Craft; Second and Third Wards, A. A. Hodge; Fourth Ward, Miss Mary Beecher.

In this connection it would not be out of place to give a few facts in regard to the census.

The year 1900 and 1901 will constitute the greatest census taking era in the history of the world. Besides this country fourteen of the principal European countries are to "count noses," but the census of the United States is to be more extensive than that of any other nation.

The last census cost \$11,271,000 and more than sixty thousand men were employed in making it. This census will even be a greater effort.

The law requires that the census shall be taken between June 1 and June 30. As four of these days fall on Sunday, but twenty-six working days are left.

The director of the twelfth census is William P. Merriam, former governor of Minnesota.

Several objectionable questions which were asked of citizens by the census enumerators ten years ago will be omitted this time. For example, persons suffering from any chronic disease will not be required to disclose that fact.

The answers given heretofore have proved utterly valueless from a statistical standpoint.

These are the questions you will be called upon to answer this year:

1. Surname, Christian name, initial.
2. Residence, street, number of house.
3. Relationship of each member of the head of the family.
4. Color or race.
5. Sex.
6. Age at last birthday.
7. Day, month and year when born.
8. Are you single, married, widow, widower or divorced?
9. Number of years married.
10. How many children.
11. Number of children living.
12. Sex of these children.
13. Where were you born? If in the United States give state or territory; if of foreign birth, give name of the country born.
14. Where was your father born. Your mother. (Same conditions as the foregoing.)
15. If of foreign birth, when did you come to the United States.
16. How many years have you resided in the United States.
17. Have you been naturalized. How many years since you became a citizen.
18. What is your occupation, trade or profession? This question applies to persons ten years of age or over.
19. How many months during the year are you employed?
20. How many months have you attended school?
21. Can you read?
22. Can you write?
23. Give the main fact concerning your education.
24. Do you own the house in which you live?
25. Do you rent the house in which you live?
26. If you own the house, is it free or mortgaged? (The same question applies to farms.)

NASHVILLE, April 24.—Several days ago the Farmers' Savings & Building & Loan Association of this city, was placed in the hands of a receiver by a decree of the United States Circuit Court, entered in the case of G. W. Harlin vs. the Farmers' Savings & Building & Loan Association. The bill was filed for the purpose of winding up the association, and stated as the reason why it should be wound up, that the company, owing to its inability to sell new stock and do new business was unable to successfully perform its corporate functions. It was alleged and stated that the liquidation of the company could be accomplished very much more cheaply and expeditiously through a receivership in the Federal Court than otherwise.

### Scarcity of Laborers.

The situation in the phosphate fields on account of the great scarcity of laborers is assuming an alarming condition. Many of the larger concerns have some heavy contracts for delivery of rock during the next three months, and from present indications they will probably have great difficulty in securing enough miners to dig, prepare and load the rock. As a result, it is highly probable that Mt. Pleasant phosphate will advance in price before another month is gone. ### The Cuban Census.

The Cuban census shows that the native Cubans compose a majority of the population, and that the whites outnumber the blacks. The total population is 1,572,797. There are 447,572 white males and 111,838 male negroes; the foreign white males being 115,790. The total male population is 815,205. There are only 20,478 Spaniards, as against 1,296,367 Cubans. There will be 140,000 qualified native voters. The negroes constitute 32 per cent. of the population.

## NOVEL GATHERING.

Over 2 000 Missionaries From All Parts of the Globe Meet in New York.

THE THIRD OF ITS KIND EVER HELD.

For Ten Years Preparations Have Been Under Way for This Conference on Foreign Missions.

Ex-President Ben Harrison Welcomed the Delegates—Many Distinguished Men Are Among the Honorary Vice Presidents.

New York, April 22.—With an ex-president of the United States, Benjamin Harrison, to bid them welcome, there were gathered in Carnegie hall, Saturday, more than 2,000 missionaries from almost every quarter of the globe. For ten years preparations have been under way for this meeting, known as the ecumenical conference on foreign missions. It is the third of its kind ever held. Every branch of the Christian church is represented, except the Roman Catholic, the Greek and that branch of the Anglican church known as the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

The foreign missionary work of the world is conducted by seven great societies. They are the Christian Missionary society, which represents the evangelical party in the church of England, and is almost as large as the other six together; the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, representing the Catholic party in the Church of England, and which declined to attend the conference; the London Missionary society of the Congregational church; the American Board of Foreign Missions, also the Congregational Church, Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions, the Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal church, and the American Baptist Missionary union.

The sessions of the conference will last until May 1, not including Sundays. On Sundays the delegates will occupy city pulpits.

The Protestant foreign missionary societies of the world spend about \$15,000,000 a year to advance their work. That is exclusive of the money expended on missions in England and America. Every cent of this vast sum is used to convert non-Christians to Christianity. This great work was first started in the close of the eighteenth century and the beginning of the nineteenth.

The great problem now is how to get money, and then how to get the greatest portion of every dollar given, to the non-Christian whom it is desired to convert. At present it is said 92 cents on the dollar actually reaches the heathen. It is hoped that the cost of administration may be much reduced, and it is hoped by this conference to effect this result.

In the list of honorary vice presidents of the conference are such names as ex-President Grover Cleveland, J. Pierpont Morgan, Seth Lov, Wm. E. Dodge, C. A. Schieren, ex-Gov. W. J. Northen of Georgia, and Miss Helen Gould.

Among the delegates are many distinguished English clergymen, including Rev. W. T. A. Barber, Lee's school, Cambridge, missionary to China; Dr. D. A. Barkley, secretary of the Irish missionary society, and Rev. W. E. Cousins, London missionary society, missionary from Madagascar.

Others present from foreign parts are Dr. and Mrs. Borgherevink, of the Nurze board of missionaries of Madagascar; Miss Budden, the London missionary society; Bishop W. R. Ridley, bishop of Caledonia; B. C. Joel Cadbury, Friends' Missionary society, Birmingham, Eng., and Rev. K. Galpin, from China.

### Mrs. C. E. Haskell Dead.

Chicago, April 22.—Mrs. Caroline E. Haskell, well known because of her gifts to the University of Chicago and to the various charitable institutions of Chicago, died Saturday in Michigan City, Ind., where she was visiting friends. Mrs. Haskell was the founder of Haskell hall and the Haskell Oriental museum of the University of Chicago. Among her endowments was \$50,000 to the Habnman hospital of this city.

### Weighing of Mail Ceases.

The weighing of the United States mail, which has been in progress all over the United States for the past sixty days, came to an end Monday afternoon, and the final reports will be sent to Washington at once. It is expected that the railroad officials will receive the reports of the number of pounds of mail handled within thirty days.

The weighing of mail this year is carrying out an old custom, one repeated every four years, and for the purpose of striking an average as to the number of pounds handled daily on each railway system, that their pay may be governed accordingly. The regular period of thirty days was doubled this year by reason of fraud practiced by certain of the Western railroads by stuffing the mails.




