The streets of Hillsboro and Corsicana are being sprinkled with crude oil instead of water.

The country through which we passed in Arkansas, was distressingly dry. From what we could see, the corn was not worth cutting in many places, and cotton was very small.

I am now in a grand good meeting at Bynum, Hill county. The people have fine farms, lovely homes, many conveniences and big hearts; and they are giving us big crowds and splendid attention.


