## WILL FIX ROADS

Durant Precinct of Good Roads  
Association Will Make Bet-  
ter Roads and Bridges.

### WORK HAS ALREADY BEGUN

Nearly Two Hundred Dollars and  
Many Days Labor Subscrib-  
ed to the Cause—Much  
Interest Manifested.

The Durant precinct of the  
Good Roads Association is get-  
ting a whirlwind move on itself  
and is making a double-barrelled  
effort toward improving the roads  
and bridges in this precinct.  
Although it has only been twenty-  
four hours since the associa-  
tion was permanently organized  
here yesterday, nearly \$200 and  
many days of labor has been  
subscribed to the cause, and the  
movement has begun, in its in-  
fancy, so to speak. It is the in-  
tention to raise at least \$500 in  
money and two hundred days of  
labor—more if possible—which  
will be expended on making bet-  
ter roads and bridges in the Du-  
rant precinct.

Road Commissioner W. T.  
Whitlatch of the Durant precinct,  
is busy now making out his slate  
of road overseers and will an-  
nounce them in a few days.  
These overseers will be re-  
quested, immediately upon ap-  
pointment, to get down to active  
work at once as no time must be  
lost in getting the roads and  
bridges in good shape for fall  
business.

Some of the work of the Durant  
precinct has already been  
planned. The bridge across Blue  
river, east of Durant, will be  
given prompt attention this week,  
also the bridge across Rack  
Creek, on the Mead road, also a  
culvert on the Mead road. A  
road will be opened up on the  
section line from the Veach  
plantation, two miles north of  
town, to a point north of Blue  
river. Next will come the work  
of fixing the roads and bridges  
of all the roads leading into and  
out of Durant. Nothing will be  
left undone to make good roads  
for the farmers to travel.

The people of the Durant pre-  
cinct, the business men as well as  
the farmers, are awakening up to  
this all-important movement, and  
if the other thirteen precincts of  
the Twenty-fifth Recording Dis-  
trict will follow in the wake there  
will be a wonderful work done  
along this line and this district  
will have, in a short time, the  
very best roads in Indian Terri-  
tory. The farmers and business  
men must harmonize in this  
movement, as good roads are as  
beneficial to the farmers as the  
business men. A little money, a  
little labor and a little energy,  
judiciously applied, will do the  
work. Let the people get to-  
gether and then to work. Do it  
now.
