THREE PAST ZERO

The Toughest Blizzard Since 1899 Visits This Section and Causes Much Suffering.

YOUNG CATTLE ARE DYING

Local Traffic and Business Almost at a Standstill—A Strong Wind Rages for Twenty-four Hours.

A blizzard, bringing the coldest weather in six years, struck this section of the Indian Territory Saturday night and has been raging in great force for more than twenty-four hours. The temperature went down to zero yesterday morning and to three below zero this morning. It is the coldest and toughest siege since February 11 and 12, 1899, six years ago. Local traffic and business is almost at a standstill.

The blizzard is generally over the Indian Territory and extends way into Texas. It is reported that there is much suffering among the poor people, especially those in the country, but no deaths have been reported. Stockmen report intense suffering among range cattle. It is estimated that the loss of cattle will be at least 25 per cent, quite a number of deaths being reported among the impoverished calves and cows.

In Oklahoma the weather is reported as being from five to ten degrees below zero, and suffering and death has been the result. Great anxiety is felt for numerous Indian tribes whose members are known to be in no condition to withstand the severity of this storm. Especially is this so of the Sac and Fox, Euche and some of the Osage, Cheyenne and Arapaho tribes. The Indians of the Sac and Fox, Cheyenne and Arapaho tribes are subject to pneumonia and experts say that dozens of them will die as a result of this blizzard.

TERRITORY PRESS DATES.

Arrangements Made For Meeting at Sulphur May 19-20.

Muskogee, I. T., Feb. 13.—The executive committee of Indian Territory Press Association met here last week and arranged a program for the meeting to be held at Sulphur, I. T., May 19 and 20, 1905. On account of the National Press Association convention, to be held at Guthrie June 2, 3 and 4, and the bankers' convention, May 17 and 18, the above dates for Indian Territory Press Association were agreed upon.

Frank M. Dunham of the Sulphur journal was elected secretary of the association, to succeed K. W. Whitmore, resigned.

Hon. R. L. Williams is home from Washington, where he has been for several days in the interest of statehood for the Indian Territory. Mr. Williams is of the opinion that there will be no statehood legislation at this session of Congress.

Rev. A. Frank Ross, J. W. Houchin, Sam. W. Hampton and Jas. K. Armstrong have departed for Fort Worth, Texas, to attend the State Convention of the Farmers' Union which convenes there tomorrow.

A couple of loads of Irish potatoes arrived Saturday and were today distributed among the farmers of this section. The producers will now get busy putting them in the ground.

Marriage license were issued Saturday at Sherman, Texas, to S. E. West and Miss Ettie Fraw of Albany.
