FIRE AT KANSAS CITY

Business Section Visited by a Tremendous Blaze.

LOSSES ARE SEVERE

Three Immense Establishments and Their Contents Go Down Before Flames and a Bank In Jeopardy.

Kansas City, Jan. 6.—The entire downtown retail district of this city was threatened Friday night by a fire which started in the rear of the three-story brick building of the Columbus Buggy company on Walnut street near Tenth, destroying that building and the adjoining building occupied by the Kimball Piano company and the Pettinger Bros. Manufacturing company, and badly damaging the National Bank of Commerce building. The fire started before 10 o'clock, and burned fiercely for two hours. The Columbus Buggy company's building and the building immediately south, occupied by the Kimball Piano company, were very inflammable, and the flames in them spread to the Commerce building, on the south, and the office on the first, second and third floors were badly damaged by fire and water. The Commerce building is one of the finest buildings in the city, and the lower floor is occupied by the National Bank of Commerce, the largest financial concern in Kansas City. The stock of Pettinger Bros. Manufacturing company, which occupied a portion of the Kimball building, was entirely destroyed. The loss on the buildings is \$150,000. The loss of the Columbus Buggy company, according to one of its managers, is \$100,000. The entire loss is estimated at \$250,000. At 2 o'clock Saturday morning the fire was under control. Cashier Rulo said there is \$3,000,000 in the bank's vaults.

PLEA FOR PATRICK.

Many Well Known Citizens Ask Executive Clemency For Him.

Albany, Jan. 6.—Governor Higgins received a petition for the exercise of executive clemency in the case of Albert T. Patrick, the New York lawyer, confined in Sing Sing prison under sentence to die in the week beginning Jan. 22 for the murder of the aged millionaire, William Marsh Rice. The petition is signed by nearly 100 well known persons, including lawyers, physicians and chemists, clergymen and laymen, and is based upon the ground that there is reasonable doubt of his guilt.

The signers of the petition include Grover Cleveland, John G. Carlisle, former Supreme Court Justice Hatch and a large number of prominent members of the New York City bar. Samuel L. Clemens (Mark Twain), Allan McLane Hamilton, the well known alienist; Dr. Austin Flint, head of the Bellevue Medical school, and many other physicians and chemists of standing; Rev. Dr. Charles H. Parkhurst, Rev. Dr. Madison C. Peters, Rev. Dr. Thomas Hughes, David Belasco, Lieutenant Colonel H. D. Borup and Robert Erskine Ely, director of the League for Political Education.

The petition was brought to Albany by Robert C. McCormick, who filed it personally with the governor. Governor Higgins said that he did not know when he would act on the matter, but that he did not expect to give a public hearing. He would give no intimation of his probable action in the case, but assured Mr. McCormick that he had already given it some attention, and would consider it with the utmost care.

CAUSALTIES MANY.

One Thousand Were Killed at Moscow and Three Thousand Wounded.

Washington, Jan. 6.—Advice has been received here from an official source, bringing the news from Moscow that 1,000 people have been killed there, and 3,000 wounded. The news from elsewhere in Russia, however, is more hopeful, the dispatches saying that the railways are gradually resuming operations. The mails, however, are still badly mixed up, and it will require two or three months for conditions to resume their normal state.

Slaughter Awful.

Tukum, Russia, Jan. 6.—Five hundred and eighty persons were killed or wounded during the recent revolt here.

WONDERFUL WELL.

It Flows Unaided Six Hundred Barrels of Oil Daily.

Pawhuska, I. T., Jan. 6.—An oil well has been struck near this place that is the wonder of the entire field. It is what is termed a gusher, and has already caused a boom in the oil business of this country. The well is flowing at the rate of 600 barrels a day, without any kind of pumping, the sand simply giving up that amount.

NEGROES ROB BOSWELL DEPOT.

Got \$15 in Money and Then Landed in Jail.

In broad day last Sunday the Frisco depot at Boswell was entered and robbed, the sum of \$15 and other small valuables being taken. The thieves, for the time, made good their escape. Deputy Marshal Stacy took trail and treed Frank Walker, Calvin Gordon and Wiley Jones, colored. They were brought to Durant and given an examination before Commissioner Elting. Walker was held in the sum of \$50.00 bond and Gordon in \$250, while Jones was released. Not being able to "make good" Walker and Gordon were jailed at Atoka to await grand jury investigation.
