**MRS. MORRIS MATTER**

Congressman Sheppard Makes Some  
Interesting Remarks.

**NO CHINESE BARRIER**

Said If a Wolf Had Howled or Bear  
Growled the President Would  
at Once Have Repaired  
to the Scene.

Washington, Jan. 11.—The recent  
ejection of Mrs. Minor Morris from the  
white house office building was made  
the subject of remarks by Mr. Shep-  
pard of Texas Wednesday. Mr. Shep-  
pard has a resolution for an investiga-  
tion of the incident pending before  
the rules committee. Mr. Grosvenor  
made the point of order that the dis-  
cussion of a resolution pending be-  
fore a committee was not proper.

"I object to a Chinese awl around  
the white house, as well as around  
the United States," Mr. Sheppard re-  
plied.

"If the gentleman thinks it is a  
proper subject matter to arraign the  
president and his household, why, let  
him go ahead," said Mr. Grosvenor.

"I will let the country judge of  
that," retorted Mr. Sheppard. "If the  
president had heard the howl of a wolf  
or the growl of a bear in the adjoin-  
ing room he would have been on the  
scene immediately," he continued, char-  
acterizing the occurrence as an "un-  
warrantable and unnecessary brutali-  
ty which demanded investigation and  
merited censure."

"If congress," he continued, "com-  
posed of American fathers, husbands,  
brothers, permits this incident to go  
unrebuked it will add a passive and  
cowardly approval of this violation of  
the most sacred principle of American  
life."

Mr. Payne of New York made the  
point of order that Mr. Sheppard was  
not discussing the bill under consid-  
eration, and when Mr. Olmstead, in  
the chair, replied that in committee  
of the whole great latitude is allowed.  
Mr. Payne remarked that he disliked  
to deprive the Democratic party of a new  
issue, but he thought the speech was  
one which would be more in place in  
a police court than in the house.

Mr. Grosvenor said he knew who dif-  
ference between the dignity of the  
house and any other house in the city,  
and he did not consider the American  
congress in the sense of a police court,  
or as having anything to do with  
the question of disorderly conduct of  
any employe in the neighborhood of  
the white house. He did not believe  
any condition had arisen where the  
husband of the woman in question  
could not secure the proper redress.  
House adjourned.

**LITTLE HEADWAY.**

**Opposition to Hamilton Bill Apparent-  
ly Develops Rather Slowly.**

Washington, Jan. 11.—Opposition  
among the Republican members of the  
house to the Hamilton joint statehood  
bill seems to be making little head-  
way. The leaders of the insurgents  
have prepared a pledge for the signa-  
tures of Republicans. This was fre-  
quently circulated Wednesday among the  
opponents of joint statehood, and is  
now said to bear forty-five signatures.  
About twenty Republican members are  
undecided on the statehood fight, and  
the struggle to win them by the oppos-  
ing factions is waxing hot.

The insurgents insist that many of  
their sympathizers have not yet had  
an opportunity to sign the pledge, and  
claim that they will readily obtain  
more than sixty names. Administra-  
tion supporters declare the total  
strength of their opponents is not much  
more than forty.

**EIGHTY BILLS PASSED.**

**One Provides For Marking Graves of  
Confederate Soldiers.**

Washington, Jan. 11.—About eighty  
bills were passed Wednesday by the  
senate, leaving on the calendar only  
six or seven measures. Of the bills  
passed a large majority grant private  
pensions, and many were bridge bills.  
One of the bills favorably acted upon  
appropriated \$500,000 for the appropri-  
ate marking of the graves of Confed-  
erate soldiers who died in northern  
prisons during the civil war.

**IMMENSE CAPITAL STOCK.**

**Certificate of Incorporation Calls For  
Forty Million Dollars.**

Hartford, Conn., Jan. 11.—A certifi-  
cate of incorporation of the Oaxaca and  
Pacific Railroad company of Hartford  
has been filed with the secretary of  
state. The authorized capital stock is  
\$40,000,000. The company proposes to  
build and operate railroads in Mex-  
ico.

**Many Killed or Wounded.**

Warsaw, Jan. 11.—The troops have  
captured the iron works at Ostrowiec,  
government of Radom, which had been  
occupied by the revolutionists as their  
headquarters. Many of the revolution-  
ists were killed or wounded.

**Numbers Slain.**

Ohatoff, Russian, Poland, Jan. 11.—  
Troops fired upon and charged crowds  
here for over an hour. Many persons  
were killed or wounded.

**Fast Mail Wrecked.**

Salt Lake City, Jan. 11.—A special  
received by the Tribune Thursday  
morning from Ogden says it is re-  
ported that the fast mail on the South-  
ern Pacific has been wrecked at Mon-  
tello Hill, 120 miles from Ogden.

**Slays Slayer.**

Stamps, Ark., Jan. 11.—City Marshal  
Fine was fatally shot by a negro named  
Matthew Williams. While falling  
he shot the negro through the heart,  
killing him. The officer was trying to  
arrest the negro.

**SCORES MODERATES.**

**Witte Says on Them Largely Depends  
Responsibility For Repression.**

St. Petersburg, Jan. 11.—Premier  
Witte Wednesday made an interesting  
statement to a delegation, headed by  
the mayor of this city, which request-  
ed a relaxation of orders of prefect of  
police against meetings in the interest  
of the electoral campaign. The premier  
could not promise to do anything un-  
til after Jan. 22. While personally he  
did not sympathize with the harsh  
measures of Interior Minister Durnovo,  
he regarded them as essential. The pre-  
mier said he could not assume the re-  
sponsibility for a course which, if it  
resulted in bloodshed, would make him  
a scapegoat. He spoke bitterly of the  
failure of the Moderates to give the  
government their support, saying that  
on their shoulders largely rests the  
burden of compelling the government  
to resort to repression.

**COMPLETE COLLAPSE.**

**Mrs. Minor Morris Is In a Rather Crit-  
ical Condition.**

Washington, Jan. 11.—Mrs. Minor  
Morris, who last week was ejected from  
the executive offices and grounds of  
the white house, Wednesday was in  
a state of complete collapse. Dr. Morris,  
her husband, stated her condition is  
critical. Her physicians have refused  
to permit any one to see her or have  
any discussion of the affair in her  
presence.

**CLAIM DENIED.**

**Judge Thompson Rules Odell Is Not  
Entitled to Exchange Seat.**

Cincinnati, Jan. 11.—The claim of W.  
J. Odell to the Holzman seat in the  
New York Stock Exchange was denied  
by the United States District Judge  
Thompson and an injunction issued to  
prevent any interference with the sale  
of the seat. On the outcome of this  
litigation depends the amount to be  
realized for the creditors of Holzman  
& Co., bankrupts, and the recent as-  
sault of the seat for \$25,000 was de-  
clared by the court to be regular and proper. The  
case will be appealed.

**SUSPENSION STATED.**

**Action Taken by Bankers Holding the  
Checks of Late L. W. Prior.**

Cleveland, Jan. 11.—Formal an-  
nouncement of the suspension of the  
firm of Denison, Prior & Co., invest-  
ment bankers and brokers, was made  
on the floor of the Cleveland Stock  
Exchange. This action was taken as  
the result of a large number of firms'  
checks being thrown out by banks,  
who hold that since the death of L.  
W. Prior, who committed suicide Tues-  
day, the checks could not pass the  
clearing house. It is said the banks  
hold ample funds and securities to  
provide for all claims against the firm.

**SEEKING SPOUSE.**

**Franklin Travels Several Thousand  
Miles Looking For Eloping Wife.**

Denison, Jan. 11.—George H. Frank-  
lin of Pierre, S. D., has been searching  
for his wife, who eloped one year ago.  
Franklin followed her several thou-  
sand miles, but lost track of her at  
San Antonio, en route to Mexico. She  
eloped with a dentist named Bishop.

**TENTH CONVENTION.**

**United Benevolent Association in Ses-  
sion at Fort Worth.**

Fort Worth, Jan. 11.—The United  
Benevolent association convened in  
tenth annual convention in this city  
Wednesday morning. One hundred del-  
egates are present. The order has a  
membership of 3,000 in Texas. Colonel  
E. W. Taylor of this city is supreme  
president.

**Decided Increase.**

San Antonio, Jan. 11.—The city board  
of equalization raised the assessment  
of the San Antonio Traction company  
from \$287,150 to \$388,475, an increase  
of \$101,325.

**IS IN SESSION.**

**Freight Rate Convention Assembles at  
Wichita.**

Wichita, Kans., Jan. 11.—The freight  
rate mass convention, made up of 600  
delegates, representing commercial and  
farmers' organizations from all parts  
of Kansas, was held here Wednesday.  
Permanent organization for the pur-  
pose of pushing the railway rate legis-  
lation was perfected. Resolutions were  
adopted urging congress to give the  
railway rate commission power to con-  
trol railroad rates. Speeches were made  
by Chairman Bristol, S. R. Vansant,  
former governor of Minnesota, and others.

**Postmasters Appointed.**

Washington, Jan. 11.—The president  
appointed postmasters as follows: In-  
dian Territory: Absalom B. Allen, Okla-  
mah; Alva A. Taylor, Wapanucka; L.  
W. Smith, Wewoka, Texas; Marshall  
Smith, Brownwood; J. A. Bowerman,  
Manfield.

**Beall's Bill.**

Washington, Jan. 11.—Congressman  
Beall introduced a bill providing for  
the return to southern people of money  
now held in treasury from cotton con-  
fiscated during the civil war.

**Bluejackets Withdrawn.**

Shanghai, Jan. 11.—All the foreign  
bluejackets who have been patrolling  
the foreign concessions have been with-  
drawn.

**Hearst in Mexico.**

Hearst of New York, his family and

**HEROES OF THE HOSE**

Thrilling Scenes Enacted During a  
Hotel Conflagration.

**SOME LIVES ARE LOST**

**One Fire Fighter Drops to His Death  
While Carrying Down a Woman,  
and Another Rescues an  
Entire Family.**

Minneapolis, Jan. 11.—Six persons  
were known to be dead and possibly  
more imprisoned in rooms as the re-  
sult of a fire early Wednesday in the  
West hotel. The blaze broke out in  
the upper stories of the building and  
electric bells immediately sounded an  
alarm in all the rooms. Many guests  
escaped down the stairways, but three  
exits were soon cut off by flames and  
the halls filled with smoke.

An unknown man jumped for the  
roof of an adjoining building from the  
top floor, but missed it and was killed,  
while a large middle-aged woman  
jumped from the fourth floor and met  
instant death. Mrs. C. H. Wood and  
daughter, proprietors of the West hotel,  
were both rescued, the latter being car-  
ried down a ladder.

One of the most thrilling rescues was  
that of F. A. Chamberlain of the Secu-  
rity bank and members of his fam-  
ily, who were not awakened in time to  
make their escape by the usual exits.  
For many anxious minutes they re-  
mained at a window in the top-most  
story at the Fifth street and Hennepin  
avenue corner. Mr. Chamberlain  
gathered bedding and sheets and made  
a rope of them, and at the same time  
extension ladders were being placed  
into position, but found to be too short.  
Pomper ladders were rushed to the  
scene and a fireman with a rope about  
him firmly placed a ladder to the  
cheers of thousands of excited specu-  
lators. Arriving at the window he took  
one after the other and lowered them  
safely to an extension ladder two  
stories beneath by means of a rope,  
where they were brought safely to the  
street. The rescue was accomplished  
amid death-like stillness. When the  
last person had been lowered and the  
firemen followed cheering broke loose.  
It was one of the most thrilling scenes  
at a fire ever witnessed in this city.

Captain John Berwin, a fireman,  
was carrying a woman down a scaling  
ladder when the terrified woman tried  
to jump to a window ledge. Captain  
Berwin thereupon lost his balance, fall-  
ing seven stories to death.

The dead: Captain John Berwin of  
Hook and Ladder company No. 1;  
Thomas Somerville of Springfield, suf-  
focated in a room on the sixth floor;  
Alice Martin, a servant, who jumped  
from the seventh floor; W. S. Nichols,  
of Nichols & Taylor of the Chamber-  
men, who jumped from the top floor.

**HARRIS LYNCHED.**

**He was Charged With Assassination of  
a White Man on Monday.**

Houston, Jan. 11.—Ben Harris, a  
negro, who was charged with the as-  
sassination of Osgo Polk at Bering's  
Mill Monday night, and taken from of-  
ficers Tuesday night at Lavelle by a  
mob numbering about seventy, was  
Wednesday morning lynched at Mos-  
cow.

After a forty-mile ride across the  
country Tuesday night a mob of fifty  
men overtook Deputy Sheriff Hunter  
and posse of Livingston, who were  
fleeing with Harris. Harris was cap-  
tured near Livingston a few hours after  
he had murdered Osgo Polk, at Bering's  
Mill. Polk was foreman and had words  
with Harris, ending by his knocking the  
negro down with a club. Harris went  
away and returned with a shot gun,  
firing two loads of buckshot into Polk,  
killing him instantly.

Learning of the approach of the mob  
the officers and posse fled from Liv-  
ingston with their prisoner. After the  
mob overtook them they boarded a  
freight train at Sheppard with the  
negro and went to Moscow, near the  
scene of the killing. There at 1 o'clock  
Wednesday morning the negro was  
bound in the presence of hundreds of  
people and strung to a telephone pole  
in front of the railroad station.

**WHITE IDENTIFIED.**

**Made His Escape Twelve Years Ago  
From the Penitentiary.**

Austin, Jan. 11.—Penitentiary offi-  
cials have identified Will White as hav-  
ing escaped from the penitentiary  
twelve years ago. He admitted his  
identity. He was convicted of burglar-  
y at Ennis.

**LUNCHES WITH PRESIDENT.**

**Cecil Lyon and Chief Executive Also  
Discussed Appointments.**

Washington, Jan. 11.—Cecil Lyon  
lunched with the president at noon  
Wednesday and talked over Texas ap-  
pointments. Matters immediately un-  
der consideration are San Antonio, Fort  
Worth, Bastrop, Stephenville, Burnett,  
Brownwood and Elgin postmasterships;  
also commissions of United States mar-  
shal and United States district attorney  
to expire shortly.

**Nearly All in Gold.**

**DR. HARPER DIES.**

**President of Chicago University Passes  
Away Wednesday Afternoon.**

Chicago, Jan. 11.—Dr. William R.  
Harper, president of the Chicago uni-  
versity, died at 2:15 o'clock Wednes-  
day afternoon. It was announced early  
in the day that Dr. Harper's condition  
was critical, and later it was reported  
by Dr. Frank G. Billings that his opi-  
on Dr. Harper would not survive  
longer than the end of this week. The  
death of Dr. Harper, however, came  
more suddenly than had been antici-  
pated. Dr. Billings had left the Har-  
per residence, on the Midway Plai-

ance, and had gone to his home, five  
miles distant, where he received at 2  
o'clock a message from the relatives of  
Dr. Harper stating that a serious  
change had taken place in the con-  
dition of the patient, and urging him to  
come at once. Dr. Billings at once  
entered his automobile and hurried as  
fast as the machine could carry him  
to the home of Dr. Harper, but arrived  
after his death.

Dr. Harper has for two years been  
suffering from a cancer located at the  
head of the large intestine. Al-  
most to the last Dr. Harper continued  
his work, laboring with great energy  
on some books relating to the Hebrew  
language, which it was his intention  
to publish.

**NO DECISION.**

**Failed to Ascertain How Far Inter-  
rogatories Could Go.**

Annapolis, Md., Jan. 11.—After an  
attempt lasting over an hour to arrive  
at exact conclusions as to how far an  
upper class man could be compelled to
