COLLEGE OPENED WEDNESDAY

PROGRESS OF SOUTHEASTERN OKLAHOMA'S GREATEST GIRLS SCHOOL—THE FACULTY

The fourth session of the Oklahoma Presbyterian College for Girls opened Wednesday morning, at 10:30, at which time the enrollment and classification of students was begun.

Among the institutions of which our city is proud is the Presbyterian College for Girls. The main building of this institution was erected three years ago at a cost of \$80,000.00, and occupies a commanding location on the outskirts of the town to the west.

The Girls' College is an outgrowth of the old Durant College, a co-educational school which existed in Durant under the auspices of the Presbyterian church—a church which during all its history has been noted for an interest in education. This work had a small beginning in an old frame structure on Main street. Later a handsome brick building was erected on Eighth and Locust, an able corps of instructors employed, and for six years or more a splendid work was done for the young men and women of Southeastern Oklahoma, under the supervision of Prof. Hotchkiss.

Recognizing that one of the greatest needs in our great country is a consecrated womanhood, and feeling that in a school distinctly for girls and women, this work could be better accomplished, the church in 1909 arranged, with the liberal aid of the people of Durant, to build and operate the College for Girls. The old buildings and grounds were sold to the city, and are now utilized for high school purposes.

In this school every phase of the girl's life is considered, and, whether from the standpoint of strong moral character, high mental attainment, or physical health and activity, the authorities of the school endeavor to give their pupils the very best and highest. To that end, they are not only qualified to teach their subjects, but whose personal contact with their students as they live with them day after day will prove uplifting and strengthening. Attention is paid also to the smaller matters of refinement and culture, as well as character building.

That such a school is appreciated by the good people of Oklahoma is attested by the fact that every year of its existence has seen an increase in the attendance. The first year saw an enrollment of 104; the second 108, and already during the last session 122 students were enrolled, which marks almost the limit of the present capacity. We are informed by the authorities that there is now a decided need for another building to be used partly for school purposes and partly to give additional dormitory room.

The courses offered in the institution comprise three academic lines leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Literature, and Bachelor of Science respectively. The work involved is fully as good as that required by any Junior College in the South, and covers a very general education. In addition to this, splendid advantages are offered in Piano, Voice Culture, Art, Expression and Domestic Science. The number of teachers in these special branches is increased every year, showing the success that is being attained by the school along these lines.

BOKCHITO SCHOOLS OPEN SEPT 22

Bokchito, Okla., Sept. 11.—The Public Schools of Bokchito will open a week from next Monday, September 22, for an eight months' term of school. The number of students enrolled for the public schools last year was 295, and it is expected that the number will be increased this year. Prof. J. T. Ryle, formerly of the Southeastern Normal School at Durant, is superintendent of the schools, with Miss Collins principal of the High School, and these two will teach all high school branches. Miss Montgomery has the work of the fourth and fifth grades, Miss Fuller that of the second and third grades, with Miss Beatty in charge of first grade work. A successful year's work is anticipated.

PRESIDENT INSISTS ON CURRENCY BILL'S PASSAGE

Washington, Sept. 11.—President Wilson is firm in his attitude that the Administration and the Democrats of the Senate and House owe it to the country to put new currency legislation on the statute books at the earliest possible moment and he so informed the members of the Democratic steering committee of the Senate who called upon him yesterday to discuss the question. The President holds that the Democratic party has promised the country to do this and he believes it should be done before the present special session ends, even though it will impose a considerable hardship on members of the Senate, who are worn out by their prolonged struggle over the tariff bill, which ended yesterday in the passage of that measure.
