JUDGMENTS AGAINST CITY

E. C. BAUM AND GUARANTEED STATE BANK BOTH WIN SUITS AGAINST CITY

The most important cases in District Court this week were those in which E. C. Baum and the Guaranteed State Bank each sued the city on warrants issued some time ago, which the city had failed to take up, and judgments were issued in both cases.

CRUCE CLAIMS RIGHT TO CRITICIZE COURT

In a letter issued Saturday, Gov. Cruce makes a rejoinder to the opinion of the Criminal Court of Appeals in the Crump case, wherein the Governor was severely criticized for utterances alleged to have been made about the court. The statement is in the form of an address to Judge Thomas H. Doyle, member of the court, who wrote the opinion, and in which the Governor explains that he has as much right to offer criticisms of the court as has the court to criticize his own acts and deeds.

WRECK ON FRISCO

The Frisco east-bound passenger train, due through Durant at 8:57, went into the ditch near Kinlock, west of Mead, Monday morning, the engine jumping the track and turning over, and several cars being derailed. Several passengers were slightly bruised and the engineer was painfully cut and bruised about the head, but not seriously hurt. The fireman and other members of the crew were injured. The cause of the wreck is said to have been spreading rails due to rotten ties.

35 PRISONERS RELEASED

Seventy-two prisoners have been released from the State penitentiary since Monday afternoon. Thirty-five went out on expiration of time, but thirty-seven released today, were discharged under the law passed by the Legislature at its last session, known as the "Good-Time" law. This law was recognized by the warden, after Judge P. B. Cole in the District Court held it to be retroactive, thus shortening the terms of many prisoners.

Judge R. L. Williams of the Oklahoma Supreme Court, and probable next Governor of Oklahoma, was in Durant attending to business matters Monday.

COUNTY'S FINANCES

MADE A CASH BALANCE OF \$42,000 ON THE LAST DAY OF SEPTEMBER

One has only to note the balance sheet of County Clerk McCreary, issued for September 30, 1913, to realize that the finances of Bryan county are in a condition.

During the month there was collected the tidy sum of \$7,638.08, as follows: Current taxes, \$5,071.07; 1911 taxes, \$243.39; 1910 taxes, \$69.91; 1909 taxes, \$78.39; 1908 taxes, \$42.50; ferret taxes, \$427.45; redemption fund, \$53.60, and miscellaneous, \$1,551.42.

At the close of the month the county possessed the sum of \$42,015.58 in real money in its several depositories, which was distributed as follows:

FRANK ROBERTS ARRESTED BY COUNTY OFFICERS WHEN RELEASED BY COMMISSIONER


