STATE CONVICTS TO WORK ON JEFFERSON HIGHWAY

State to Furnish Men and Feed and Highway Association to Provide Tools, Guards and Shelter—Start Her and Work North.

President Paul Nesbitt of the Oklahoma Division of the Jefferson Highway Association was here from McAlester Thursday night, where he met with a number of prominent good-rovers, including President J. B. Smith of the Bryan County Division, when it was learned that the State Board of Affairs is agreeable to immediately placing a gang of convicts at work on the Jefferson Highway.

According to Mr. Nesbitt, about thirty convicts will be brought to this county, where they will start to work at Red River and work north on Bryan County's division of the Highway, making an approved dirt highway clear through the county. Other gangs will start at the north side of the State, in Craig County, and work south. It is believed that by the end of the summer, this State's end of the Highway, save for the possible exception of expensive bridges, will be ready for the final inspection of the officials of the Association.

Information given to this paper indicates that the only expense that the Highway Association will have to bear in the working of convicts will be the difference in cost of feeding the men, between the cost at the prison and cost on the road, and the expense of sheltering and guarding them.
