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WOODROW WILSON IS RE-NOMINATED.

The Democratic National Convention in session in St. Louis Thursday night re-nominated Woodrow Wilson as candidate for president of the United States, with Vice-President Thomas Marshall as his running mate. The nomination was made by acclamation and there was not a dissenting vote, and the great coliseum was packed like sardines in a can to hear the nomination. Never before in the history of Democracy have the party leaders been in such perfect accord.

It was at first thought an effort would be made to modify the tone of the Americanism plank as approved by Mr. Wilson, and he made it clear that any modification would be unacceptable to him. It was adopted exactly as it came from the White House.

As approved by the President the plank would charge a conspiracy on the part of some foreign-born citizens to participate in politics and influence foreign and internal affairs in the interest of foreign Governments and would condemn any organization countenancing such a movement and any political party receiving any benefit from it and failing to repudiate it.

PROGRESSIVE TO SUPPORT WILSON AND TICKET.

Chickasha, Ok., June 21.—E. L. Perkins of this city, a recent delegate from the sixth district to the progressive convention at Chicago, has announced that he will support Wilson and the national Democratic ticket at this fall. Mr. Perkins was a candidate on the Progressive ticket for congress in this district two years ago.

KATY LAYING 90-POUND STEEL.

The Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway has commenced laying ninety-pound steel rails between McAlester and Stringtown and expects in the near future to have double track laid between McAlester and Demmon, Texas. Other extensive improvements are contemplated by the Katy in the near future on its Oklahoma lines.
