FORMER DURANT MAN A SUICIDE IN ARIZONA
Jos. L. Piper Shot Himself to Death Oct. 5—He and His Wife Both Seriously Sick at the Time.
Word reached here this week of the suicide at Prescott, Arizona, on October 5, of Jos. L. Piper, formerly of Durant, the deceased having taken his own life with a pistol.
At the time both Mr. and Mrs. Piper were seriously ill, he with pneumonia and his wife with influenza. Their little boy, about three years of age, was also ill. Doctors had told Joe that day that if he expected to get well he must go to a hospital, and immediately when they had left to call an ambulance he entered his wife's room, sawing he heard someone at the back of the house, and got his pistol. His wife followed him and opened the bathroom door just as he fired a bullet into his temple, when he fell dead at her feet.
Mrs. Piper was made worse by the tragedy, which shattered her already weak nerves; but report says she is now some improved. At the time of the affair, Mr. Piper's fever had run up to about 105 degrees, and it is believed that the act was partly due to delirium, coupled with discouragement over the illness of his family and himself.
Mr. Piper lived in Durant for about two years, engaging in the life insurance business. He resided with his mother in their own home on West Main street, and here was married to Miss Grace Tupman. After leaving her they moved to Galveston, where he worked on the Galveston Tribune for a while, and then moved to Prescott, Arizona, for the benefit of Mrs. Piper's health.
