News of the World in Brief

Paris and France generally this week face a coal famine and paralysis of industry. Paris on Monday had only a 48 hours supply.

Six negroes at Helena, Ark., have been given the death sentence in connection with the recent rioting and murders in that section.

The peace conference at Paris expects to finish its labors and its American members to return home by Christmas.

As a result of a fire at Wilson, near Admeto, last Sunday, five persons were burned to death and one other not expected to live. The dead are Mrs. Young and baby, two children of Chas. Hudgins, and an oil field worker named Shoultis. Mrs. Shoultis is not expected to live.

Bud Bailey was acquitted at Ardmore Monday of the murder of Dad Brazier. Information has been filed against Less Sigler, who was chief of police at the time, charging him with the murder.

Coalgate striking miners are hunting and fishing, and many of them picking cotton. The best of feeling prevails between them and the National Guard and they fraternize to a considerable extent.

Cotton producers and buyers of southern Oklahoma will meet in Oklahoma City November 14 to formulate plans for the stabilizing of the State's staple cotton crop and to discuss planting better seed.

Two army officers of the Southern department have been arrested at San Antonio charged with being short in their accounts in the sum of \$314,000.

The Oklahoma and Missouri University football eleven played their annual game, on a very muddy field, at Norman last Saturday. The result was a tie, 6 to 6.

Congressmen Carter and Ferris will come to Oklahoma to assist Claude Weaver in his campaign for Representative from the Fifth District.

Announcement is made of the approaching marriage of Patrick J. Hurley, Tulsa oil man, and Miss Ruth Wilson, daughter of Admiral and Mrs. Henry D. Wilson.

In a pistol battle at San Augustine, Texas, Sunday,

Tony Miller killed sheriff R. L. Watts, and was in turn killed by deputy sheriff Wilkerson.

General Pershing disagrees with the War Department and the general staff as to the size of the standing army. He says 300,000, raised by voluntary enlistment, should be the outside figure, and favors universal military training to provide an emergency reserve.

It is now proposed that a final roll call be taken in the U. S. Senate November 12 on the military.

Five states, Massachusetts,

New Jersey, Maryland, Kentucky and Mississippi, elected Governors this week.

Oklahoma A. & M. lost to Texas A. & M. at College Station, Texas, Friday. Score 28 to 0.

Johnston County is considerably worked up over two murders committed in the Milburn neighborhood last week. One was an infant, and the other of a returned soldier who was killed and then tied to a wild mule and dragged for several miles. Officials are investigating the homicides.

Travel by airplane is attracting the wealthy Osage Indians and regular air service is to be established between Homing and Pawhuska. An Indian and his wife, in separate machines, made the trip one day last week to visit friends, and others came by airplane to attend an Indian meeting.

F. E. Young of Bartlesville, has been appointed Assistant State Insurance Commissioner. He was in the 36th Division in the big war.

NAVY RECRUITS FOR U. S. S. OKLAHOMA

"Keep the Home in Oklahoma" is the slogan of the U. S. S. Oklahoma, and all hands point with pride to the perfect harmony and spirit of co-operation which prevails aboard the ship, a spirit that has resulted in topnotch efficiency. The U. S. S. Oklahoma is more than a battleship, being included in the superdreadnaught class with displacement of 28,500 tons and being capable of firing a broadside of seven tons of metal. In this day of huge fighting ships the comfort of the personnel is much more considered than in the old days of the sailing ships. Now the ships have a band and an orchestra, two moving picture machines, a stage for theatrical entertainments and boxing bouts, and all sorts of athletic teams including a race boat, and a library of five thousand volumes in fact everything that might contribute to the comfort of the personnel.

The ship's company is divided into divisions the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th manning the turrets and so on, including the 5-inch gun divisions, marine guard, signal radio, engine, boilers, auxiliaries, electricians

repair, supply and medical divisions, each division maintaining its own athletic teams and competing for the ships championship, while the best players are taken for the ship's team which competes with other ships for the fleet title. The Oklahoma is now in Norfolk Navy Yard after a busy year which, starting with August 1, 1918, when the Oklahoma, in company with the Nevada, crossed the Atlantic to base on Bantrey Bay in order to forestall the possibility of German raiders attacking the transports. After the armistice was signed the Oklahoma sailed to Portland, England, and went on leave to London. Leaving Portland the fleet put to sea and met the president off the coast of France and escorted him to Brest, leaving there to return to the United States.

A cruise of Southern waters followed the holiday leave, the fleet basing on Guantanamo, Cuba, and holding the customary maneuvers and target practice and the baseball games and boat races for the fleet championship. In a week end between two weeks of cruising the Oklahoma stopped at Barbadoes for three days.

Then the fleet went north and the Oklahoma was ordered to proceed to Brest to await the return of the president and while the peace negotiations were being completed all hands got a week's leave to Paris and

visited the battle from Rheims, Soissons, O. Thierry, Belleau Wood, Marne sector.

Brest was left on the 6th of June, the Oklahoma being the U. S. S. George Easton which was ordered to the President, and upon arrival in the United States he completed a year of activity.


