speech of Hon. John A. Ingrossoll.

In Senate, Saturday, Jan. 4, 1862, on the Location of a Naval Depot and Dock-Yard in the Northwest.

(Reported by A. W. Stout, for the Bay City Press)

IN SENATE, Jan'y 4th, 1862.

Mr. INGROSSOLL, unanimous leave having been granted, introduced the following:

JOINT RESOLUTION for the location and establishment of a naval station and dock yard within the State of Michigan:

Whereas, The relations of the United States with foreign countries are such that it is important that prompt and ample measures be taken to provide adequate protection to the commerce of our sea and coast, and to secure the more perfect defense of our exposed frontiers; and whereas, it is the highest interest and the indispensable duty of the Government of the United States to immediately establish a naval station and dock yard for the construction and equipment of suitable vessels for such service; and

Whereas, The State of Michigan, almost entirely surrounded by navigable waters, the opposite shore of a large portion of which are held by a foreign government, thus exposing to incursions and invasions by the hostile arms of such a power, and

Whereas, The State of Michigan, almost entirely surrounded by navigable waters, the opposite shore of a large portion of which are held by a foreign government, thus exposing to incursions and invasions by the hostile arms of such a power, and

Resolved, That our Senators in Congress be instructed, and our Representatives requested, to urge and present this measure to the consideration of the General Government, and to use all honorable means to secure the immediate location and establishment of a naval station and dock yard at such point on the Saginaw river, within the State of Michigan, as shall be selected by the Navy Department for that purpose.

[The resolution having been referred to the Committee on Federal Relations, the same was reported back with an amendment—substituting "Grand Haven, on Lake Michigan," instead of "at some point on the Saginaw river." The question being on the adoption of the resolution as amended by the Committee, Mr. INGROSSOLL, in relation to the proposed location of a naval station and dock yard at some point on the Saginaw river, within the State of Michigan, as shall be selected by the Navy Department for that purpose.

And allow me here to remark, sir, in answer to the assertion that a former United States survey has reported in favor of Grand Haven as the only proper place for just such a work as is here called for, that the very reverse is the case.—On the authority of a scientific gentleman now within the hearing of my voice, who is deeply identified with the progress of Michigan, but has no pecuniary interest in the settlement of this matter, and whose integrity is beyond suspicion, I assert that the principal engineer of the Lake survey, by authority of the Government, expressly reported adverse to the mouth of Grand River, when a similar question was before mooted.
