The entire proceedings will amply repay a careful perusal, the addresses, debates, and even the business details bear the stamp of the earnest business which was so happily consummated in the glorious result now before the people for their ratification.

By a typographical omission, the name of HON. HENRY HART, as President of the convention was left out of its proper place under the head of "permanent organization."

Considerable matter had to be left out which would have published but for lack of space. The material portion, however, of the proceedings is embodied in the report as given.

U. S. 7-30 LOAN.

The Secretary of the Treasury gives notice that subscriptions will be received for Coupon Treasury Notes, payable three years from Aug. 15, 1904, with semi-annual interest at the rate of seven and three tenths per cent. per annum—principal and interest both to be paid in lawful money.

These notes will be convertible at the option of the holder at maturity, into six per cent. gold bearing bonds, payable not less than five nor more than twenty years from their date, as the government may elect. They will be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$5,000, and all subscriptions must be for fifty dollars or some multiple of fifty dollars.
