LOSE OUT

The Advocates of a Mass-Convention Fail after Marshaling their Force for that Purpose--Old Plan Unchanged Except Date

Only Four Regular Committeemen Present--Newcomers Allowed no Voice in Party Councils--Schubert's Candidacy Endorsed but He is not Declared the Nominee--Hotly Contested Meeting but Good Feeling Prevails

The Democratic Executive Committee met Saturday February 3, 1906, in the Circuit Court Room at Lawrenceburg, pursuant to the call of the Chairman.

Upon call of roll the following committeemen were found to be present: B. Bimmell from 2nd district, W. C. Vandiver from 6th district, A. M. Oehman from 10th district, J. M. Craig from 11th district. Total 4.

The following proxies were allowed: J. F. Busby for W. E. Cannon of 1st district, Horace Frierson, Jr. for J. P. Conway of 3rd district, Neal Brown for J. K. Durrett of 4th district, B. P. Lumpkins for J. F. Webb of 5th district, Sam D. Neelley for W. H. Neal of 8th district, L. B. White for W. E. Voorheis of 12th district. Total 6.

The Chairman stated that the Committee was called together to consider the advisability of altering the plan of selecting gubernatorial delegates adopted at the January meeting so that there might be no inconvenience or conflict in those districts having two or more polling places, which might arise if mass-conventions were held on the day of the Senatorial primary, and asked for suggestions from Messrs. Frierson, Oehman, Crawford and others. Mr. Crawford responded saying that he favored a primary in each district on the day of the Senatorial primary, wherein each Democrat could have a free and practical way of registering his wish. That one delegate be elected for each 10 Democratic voters in the district, the delegates so elected to meet in Lawrenceburg on the Monday following, in a delegated convention and take such action as to Governor, Railroad Commissioner, Treasurer, Controller, State Senator, Floater, platform and resolutions, at they saw proper, as representatives of the people of their districts.

Mr. Vandiver moved that this plan be adopted.

Mr. Oehman very strongly endorsed this plan, saying that the people were restive under those machine methods that denied them a free expression and that great danger to the Democratic party would certainly result from such methods. That the people would attend the Senatorial primary on that day and thus be not inconvenienced by a separate meeting, and that the primary plan met the demands of the people.

Mr. Oehman questioned the right of a committee being made up of proxies, and opposed their being admitted.

After some discussion the Chairman ruled that they be allowed.

Mr. Frierson spoke in opposition to the primary plan, and strongly urged an early mass-convention, saying that before May 12, the race for Governor would be practically settled, and he

wanted Lawrence County to act early, so as to stand a better show to obtain favors from the State administration.

Mr. Bimmell moved that a committee of three be appointed to draft a plan. Carried.

The chair appointed Messrs. Frierson, Oehman and Craig.

Mr. White said that he favored a delegated convention of the County, as opposed to a mass-meeting, as it was fairer and gave to the masses of the party a chance to be heard.

He was asked if he did not think that a direct primary vote the fairest and most convenient way for the people to select their delegates to this delegated convention.

Mr. Frierson moved to reconsider this motion, which was carried, whereupon he moved that the plan adopted at the January meeting as shown in the minutes be amended so as to strike out the words "Saturday May 12, 1906," and insert therefor "Saturday February 24, 1906," and strike out the words "Monday May 14, 1906," and insert therefor "Monday February 26, 1906," the original plan remaining otherwise unchanged.

Mr. Oehman and others opposed this motion.

It was agreed that Mr. Frierson's motion be amended by substituting the dates March 3rd and 5th for February 24 and 26, and the motion was adopted.

Mr. R. B. Williams offered the following resolution:

WHEREAS our sister County Lewis has selected the Hon. Fred Schubert as her candidate for the Floterial District composed of Giles, Lawrence, Lewis and Wayne counties, and

WHEREAS After the said Floterial District was formed that the said counties entered into an agreement through their representatives as Democrats to alternate and

WHEREAS Under said agreement Giles and Lawrence and Wayne through the Senatorial District have had their county man endorsed and elected, now in the spirit of fairness and harmony

BE IT RESOLVED By the Democratic Executive Committee of Lawrence County assembled in executive session that we do endorse the Hon. Fred Schubert as Floterial candidate from this Floterial District.

Mr. Crawford opposed the resolution saying that he did not oppose the rotation agreement, and was entirely willing that Lewis have the nominee, but believed that there was danger to the party in refusing to allow the people to say who should represent them in an office so closely affecting their every day affairs. He said that it seemed to him that it was improper for a committee of proxies to undo the action of the regular committee at its January meeting, at a meeting called for another specified purpose.

Judge Williams replied that Giles and Lawrence had already had their turn and strongly appealed for the same right being accorded the little

County of Lewis. In response to questions he said that the "rotation agreement" was made when the district was formed at a meeting of the Congressional Committee of the Seventh District and that he understood that it expired with this year. He opposed with emphasis the "Young blood's attempt to suggest Democratic polity to the gray haired fathers."

Mr. Crawford asked "How long must blood be here, before it be allowed a voice in party councils?"

"Until it is naturalized," retorted Mr. Williams.

"I only asked to find out if the Judge and myself had attained that privilege," said Mr. Crawford.

Mr. Oehman took a decided stand against the resolution saying that he knew Mr. Schubert and knew the people and that they would not consider him the nominee of the party, and would not vote for him. He wanted his protest to go on record.

Mr. White said that he had written to the Chairmen of Lewis Giles and Wayne, as directed to do by the Committee at its January meeting, urging them to meet and adopt a plan of nominating which would give the people a hearing, and that he had not heard from Giles, that Mr. Gower of Wayne wanted the "rotation agreement" to go undisturbed, but was willing to meet and consider a plan to give the whole district a voice in nominating, that Mr. Schubert was not willing to have his race passed upon outside of Lewis County. Mr. White favored endorsing Mr. Schubert. He said that the letters from Messrs. Wade and Schubert were at his office and he could not present them to the Committee.

Mr. Oehman wanted to know if Mr. Schubert if elected would support the nominee of the Senatorial primary if elected.

Mr. White read from Mr. Schubert's letter as follows:

NOTE.—Mr. Schubert's letter was not left with the Secretary for record and therefore cannot be given.

He stated that this was the only objection he had ever had to Mr. Schubert, and that this was now removed.

The resolution was adopted, after which the meeting adjourned.
