FULL REPORTS

Of Both Democratic Conventions-- Secretaries Give Both Sides of the Deplorable Muddle-Take Your Choice

The delegates of Lawrence Co met in convention in the Courthouse as per call @ 1 p. m. March 5th 1906. Hon. L. B. White Chairman of Committee stated reason of meeting and called the meeting to order. The names of J. W. Garrett and J. D. Burch were placed before the house as Tempo Chair. The vote resulted in the election for J. W. Garrett. The names of L. O. Crane and C. D. Brewer were put before the convention as Temp. Secretary, L. O. Crane being elected. The following committees were appointed by chair committees on credential, Resolutions permanent Organization and representation.

Committee on Cred. S. L. Yarbro, R. H. Harvey Geo L. Kelly E. P. Hickman and C. D. Brewer. Committee on resolutions John Tays R. B. Williams W. B. Dawson G. W. Gray and J. M. Craig Committee on Org. John Tays T. C. Locke R. H. Harvey W. R. Dunaway and R. B. Williams. Committee on Representation A. A. Patterson C. W. Freeman, Base Tidwell A. M. Oehman and L. O. Crane. The committee on credentials filed a report stating the regularly elected delegates which was adopted. There was a minority report signed by A. M. Oehman which took some exceptions but this report was not agreed to by the convention.

The Committee on Per. Org. recommended L. B. White as Chairman and L. O. Crane Secy. This report was adopted.

The committee on resolutions reported the following resolutions were adopted endorsing the administration of Gov Cox Hon. R. E. Folk State Treas. and Frank Dibrell Compt. and endorsing the convention to support the two later for re-election also endorsing the method of rotation as heretofore practiced in the 17th Flatorial and 22nd Senatorial districts and according to rotation it being Lewis county time to put forth her candidate That we support Hon Fred L. Schubert for Representative in the 17th Flo District. The Committee on representation made a report allowing 1 vote to every 25 votes cast for President in last election or fraction thereof. It was then moved we vote in the convention in Nashville as a unit motion was carried at this point twelve or fourteen Patterson delegates left the room lead by J. D. Burch.

It was moved we cast our thirteen votes for the Hon John I Cox for Governor, in the convention in Nashville May 26 1906, motion carried.

It was moved we indorse the actions of Hon A. A. Patterson as Representative and Sen Rufus McLaurine. This motion carried. The convention then adjourned subject to the call of the Chair.

In compliance with the the action of the Democratic Executive Committee, the delegates elected on Saturday, March 3, met in convention in the Court House at Lawrenceburg, Monday March 5, 1906, to organize. The duly elected Patterson delegates after being denied a fair representation, ignored by the Cox delegates in every particular instance, and after exhausting every honorable means in an attempt to secure for themselves and the Democrats they represented in said convention a fair expression of the will of a majority of the Democrats in Lawrence County withdrew from said convention together with a number of representative Democrats from nearly every district in the County, and assembled at the office of the Lawrence Democrat and proceeded to organize.

Dr. W. W. Neal was unanimously made temporary permanent Chairman

and A. M. Oehman was unanimously selected as the temporary and permanent Secretary. A motion was made by J. D. Burch that the Chairman appoint a committee of three on basis of representation, credentials and resolutions, was unanimously adopted. Chairman Neal appointed the following Committees.

A motion to adopt these resolutions was unanimously carried.

The following resolutions were offered by A. M. Oehman, whereas a full expression of the will of the Democracy has not been had in the District Conventions held on Saturday March 3, and whereas the will as expressed on the day above mentioned was ignored, and whereas a large majority of the Democrats of Lawrence County favor the nomination of the Hon. M. R. Patterson for Governor. Therefore in the spirit of fairness, and for the sake of peace and harmony in Democratic ranks, a thing so eminently essential for future success of the party in Lawrence County. Be it therefore resolved that the Democratic Executive Committee be hereby requested to call a primary to be held May 12, on the day of the Senatorial Primary, and that the candidate for Governor receiving the highest number of votes in said primary be given the entire vote of Lawrence County for Governor in the Gubernatorial Convention to be held in Nashville, May 25, 1906, and that the delegates to said convention be so instructed to cast said vote as expressed in said primary. Resolutions were unanimously adopted.

It was moved and seconded that Dr. W. W. Neal be added as a delegate, and that the Chairman and Secretary serve throughout the convention to be held at Nashville, May 25, and that they cast the vote of Lawrence County as a unit as per instructions. Motion unanimously adopted. Motion made and adopted to adjourn.
