Republicans

Meet

Candidates for Sheriff, Trustee and Tax Assessor Named.

The Republican Convention met here Saturday with all except two districts represented, N. B. Simms former Chairman appointed Joe P. Kidd as temporary Chairman and Charles McLean as Secretary.

Committees on Permanent Organization and Credentials were appointed. The Committee on Permanent Organization retired to decide on definite plans and reported shortly recommending the Temporary Chairman and Secretary. Chairman Kidd made a short opening address encouraging organization and saying that if there was anything that he liked better than a Republican it was two Republicans.

The Convention immediately took up the business of nominating the candidates. John Crews, after an eloquent speech placed the name of J. R. Boyett before the Convention. He was elected by acclamation and without opposition.

N. B. Simms placed the name of Tom Noblett before the convention for Trustee, and B. E. Underhill was nominated for Tax Assessor.

Both these candidates were chosen without opposition. The convention immediately adjourned.

By this change the Democrat will be easily the best and biggest paper issued in any county in Tennessee having not more than twice the population of Lawrence. We frankly admit that the very gratifying increase in our subscription list during the past month or so, has encouraged us to make the change at an increased expense, to a bigger and we trust, better paper.

When we first bought the Democrat in the fall of 1903, it was a seven column folio, printed on an old fashioned Washington Hand Press. Since that time step by step we have brought the paper up to its present standard, have added to the office equipment until our plant is worth more than all the other Lawrence County printing plants combined. We have our own opinions and have ever been free to express them regardless of any possible injurious effect on our business, but while this is true, we have at all times tried to be fair with those who did not agree with us, and to have given the news without bias or prejudice. To this policy we owe the large measure of success that has been ours, and this policy we will still pursue. Registration of Voters Required

New Census Puts Eighth District Under Dortch Law

Under the Census of 1910, the Eighth District of Lawrence County is brought under the operation of the Dortch Law, and the Australian ballot and registration of voters will be required.

Since a special election will be held in Lawrence County, on the road bond issue, the registration books will have to be opened twenty days before that date under the law. It is probable that they will be opened about Feb. 22, 23 or 24 for this purpose. This paper calls upon the people of Lawrenceburg and the Eighth District to bear in mind that unless they register at this time they cannot vote, and also no one can be registered unless he has paid his poll tax for the year 1911.

It will be remembered that under the acts of 1901 we were once required to register, but this law was later declared unconstitutional on a technicality.

The increase in population, in town and in County however, has again brought us under the operations of this law.

Remember; you must register, and you must pay your poll tax before you can vote.
