The Call of the First Disciples. Mark i:14-28; Luke v:1-11.

Golden Text—The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that he will send forth laborers into his harvest. Matt. ix:37-38.

1 Verses 14-15—How do you understand the phrase, "preaching the gospel of the kingdom of God?"

2 What is repentance?

3 If a man is truly penitent does he necessarily believe the gospel? Why or why not?

4 Verses 16-18—Take the two occupations, literal fishermen and "fishers of men," and say which would be the more honorable calling to one whom God had called to be a literal fisherman?

Vertrees Members Delayed Letter

Claimed Willingness to Meet but Communication was Slow.

Nashville, Tenn., Feb. 24—Delay, whether studied or not, no doubt, prevented a meeting of the harmony primary board at 11 o'clock Friday morning, and as a consequence the six members of the board have scattered to their homes, after a two days stay in Nashville, without accomplishing anything more tangible than an exchange of notes.

The delay, as explained in a communication from R. B. Sneed to the three members of the board named by Maj. W. O. Vertrees, chairman was due to failure to deliver a communication addressed to the three members of the board appointed by the committee of which Col. O. C. Bartow is chairman, until the very hour set for assembling, at which time two members of the board, Hon. Frank Thompson and Hon. Frank Spurlock, were en route to their homes in East Tennessee.

"Your communication was handed to me at 11 o'clock," wrote Mr. Sneed, and I understand you had information from Mr. Thompson that he had made arrangements to leave Nashville for Chattanooga at that time, and that Mr. Spurlock had already left for the train to Chattanooga when your letter was delivered to me.

With this final word the correspondence between the two committees was closed. The only other letter written by the members of the board appointed by Chairman Vertrees, as far as known, was a formal notification of their inability to perfect organization.

With the failure of the primary board to prescribe rules and regulations for the primary, the effort to establish harmony in the Democratic ranks of Tennessee again rests with the two state committees. Already Chairman Barton has called his committee to meet at Nashville on February 28, and has urged Chairman Vertrees to call his committee to meet on the same date. So far, Chairman Vertrees has not formally declined to call his committee together, although his statements in the lobbies Friday were taken to indicate that he would remain obdurate and would take no action for the promotion of party unity.

The failure of the primary board to organize was a distinct disappointment to the majority of the candidates for the various state offices and a number of them were heard to express themselves to that effect. There was some agitation for the calling of a mass convention for the purpose of reorganizing party affairs, but it is not believed this will be attempted. This proposal came first from Gen. Walter Faulkner of Lebanon, candidate for governor, in an interview given out Tuesday at Camden. It has been generally discussed by the politicians assembled here, finding favor with some, and being bitterly condemned by others.

With the departure Thursday evening of Hon. Frank Ewing for points in Virginia, there remained in Nashville but one member of the primary board—Hon. Hill McAlister, who resides here.

Roosevelt Announces His Candidacy

Will be in the Race for President Until Republican Convention Makes the Nomination.

New York Feb. 25—"I will accept the nomination for President if it is tendered me, and I will adhere to this decision until the convention has expressed its preference," is Colonel Roosevelt's reply to the letter of seven republican governors asking him to stand for nomination.

The eagerly awaited reply was given out tonight at Colonel Roosevelt's offices here during his absence on a trip to Boston. It was unexpectedly brief, but definite, it follows:

"New York, Feb. 24, 1912—Gentlemen: I deeply appreciate your letter, expressing as it does the carefully considered convictions of the men elected by popular vote to stand as the heads of government in their several states.

"I absolutely agree with you that this matter is not one to be decided with any reference to the personal preferences or interests of any man, but purely from the standpoint of the interests of the people as a whole.

"I will accept the nomination for President if it is tendered me, and I will adhere to this decision until the convention has expressed its preference.

"One of the chief principles for which I have stood, and for which I now stand, and which I have always endeavored and always shall endeavor to reduce to action is the genuine rule of the people, and therefore I hope that so far as possible the people may be given the chance, through direct primaries to express their preference as to who shall be the nominee of the republican presidential convention.
