

Regular Session of City Council

Ordinance Prohibiting Gates Opening on Street Passes First Reading

City council met Friday night in regular monthly session with Mayor Garrett and councilmen McClanahan, Stockard, Y T Garrett, W C Parkes, Comer, E G Parkes and Sebade present.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and adopted. Minutes of call meetings on May 13th, 21st, 22nd, and June 6th were read and adopted.

The report of the Secretary on the collection for the concrete laid showed that comparatively all collections had been made.

It was moved the sidewalk ordered down on North side of Della Street be revoked after passing the West side of Marsh Avenue, going West. Carried.

Moved that walks be laid on West side of Marsh Avenue and that Secretary serve notices. Carried.

Dr. Stockard introduced an ordinance to amend an ordinance for laying sidewalks on the South side of Waterloo Street, seconded by W P McClanahan. Ordinance passed first reading.

Report of E A Yarbrough, sup't was read and accepted.

City Marshall's report was read and accepted.

Recorder White's report read and accepted.

Fire Chief's report read and accepted.

Secretary and Treasurer's report read and accepted.

H M White submitted an ordinance prohibiting the hanging of gates or bars in the city of Lawrenceburg so that they will swing over the sidewalks or out on public property and that property owners who have gates swinging in this way change these upon being notified, and that a fine of not less than \$2 nor more than \$10 be imposed for each misdemeanor. This motion passed first reading.

Agricultural Special Here July 3

Capt. Peck Will Send Out Special Train on Tour of State

Capt. T. F. Peck, Commissioner of Agriculture will send out an agricultural special train on a tour of the state. This special will leave Nashville July 1st and will make, in all, about two hundred stops. This train will be run under the auspices of the state department of agriculture, and will carry extensive exhibits from the health department and the department of education. The equipment for the train is furnished free of charge by the railroads, and train will consist of Pullman, Passenger and Demonstration coaches.

On July 3 this train will be at Summertown from 1:30 a. m. to 1:00 p. m.

Lawrenceburg 3:00 to 5:00 p. m. And night meeting at Loretto.

Aboard the special will be a number of government experts in agriculture and speeches will be made at the various stops.

WOODROW WILSON'S OLD BELIEFS.

[New York Globe.]

Back in 1894, long before he became infected with personal political ambition, Woodrow Wilson wrote essays, published in the Atlantic Monthly, that his enemies do not apparently care to quote. For example, there is one on Walter Bagehot in which the following passage occurs:

Moreover, there is a deeper lack in Bagehot. He has no sympathy with the voiceless body of the people, with the "mass of unknown men." He conceives the work of government to be a work which is possible only to the instructed few. He would have the masses served, and served with devotion, but he would not like to see them attempt to serve themselves. He has not the stout fiber and the unquestioning faith in the right and capacity of inorganic majorities which make the democrat. He has none of the heroic boldness necessary for faith in wholesale political aptitude and capacity. He takes democracy in detail in his thought, and to take it in detail makes it look very awkward indeed.

Woodrow Wilson is accused of being a "Federalist." It is charged that his present sympathy with democratic ideas is a pretense. He is accused of the meanness of changing his convictions in the hope of getting office.

It is doubtful whether American political history, full as it is of reckless slander, furnishes an instance of character assassination more contemptible than that of which Woodrow Wilson has been the victim.
