May Extend Telephone Lines

Leoma-Mockeson Co. to Connect with Bell Co. with Exchange at Leoma.

A matter which should be of considerable interest to the merchants and public in general in and about Lawrenceburg, is the proposed extension of the Cumberland Telephone and Telegraph lines in this County.

Contracts have already been drawn up and signed for connection with the Leoma-Mockerson Telephone Company at their exchange in Leoma, Tenn.

This company while only recently organized, has lines running out of Leoma, and thoroughly covering the territory between that point and Appleton, Peach and Mockerson.

This will give the Bell subscribers free service to all patrons on the Leoma-Mockerson Company's lines, in addition to the West Point and Iron City exchanges, which were added some months ago.

Manager Grigsby is making every effort to have his system cover every nook and corner of the county and it was with this in view that he has been working so diligently to make this connection with the Leoma company.

This will be of great benefit to the merchants and business men of Lawrenceburg in as much as it covers a territory that heretofore was practically isolated from outside points, so far as telephone service was concerned.

President Tandy of the Leoma company states that everything is being rushed with a view to making the connection as soon as possible and thinks that their exchange will probably be ready for service within the next two weeks.

Manager Grigsby is very desirous of extending these rural lines over the county and any assistance that could be given by any of his friends or patrons will be greatly appreciated. He insists that the telephone is as great a factor in the improvement and development of a community as good roads or the rural route, etc.

Burford Smith and family enjoyed the Fourth with Calvin Howell and family.


Jim Wilburn of Arkansas was here this week visiting relatives.
