At Teachers Meet--Association at Nashville Thursday and Friday Largest Ever Held

At the meeting of the Middle Tennessee Teachers Association on last Thursday and Friday Prof. D. C. Stunkard was elected President.

It was considered the best meeting ever held, with the largest attendance. Eleven hundred being present and three hundred enrolled at this meeting. This association had its beginning in Nashville years ago and has steadily grown until it is now one of the strongest in the South. Prof. Joe Sims made a strong speech on Friday, and was a controlling factor in the convention. Prof. Sims was Chairman of the Executive Committee two years past and to him is due the credit of such a splendid program of this last meeting.

Prof. Stunkard came to Lawrenceburg about five years ago and has, as our people all know, made a most efficient and capable Principal. Each year he has improved the different departments and has built up one of the best and strongest high schools in Tennessee. We are proud of our corps of teachers. May the day soon come when we can have a ten months free school.

A Sketch of the Life of Hon. H. A. Killen, Deceased, of Green Hill, Alabama.

Mr. Killen was born January 31, 1837, near Green Hill, Lauderdale County, Alabama. He was of Scotch Irish parentage. He was reared on the farm and at the age of 24 when the Civil War began he donned the gray uniform and enlisted in the Twenty-Seventh Alabama, regiment of Infantry. He was in all the campaigns of the western department, at Fort Donelson, Corinth, Miss, Port Hudson, La., Vicksburg and in Kentucky, Georgia, Tennessee, and at North Carolina when the army surrendered, his record as a soldier was all that could be said of a true, brave and loyal man, 'twas said of him that he was never absent without leave, never sick in hospital or wounded.

After the war was over he returned home to find desolation, but with that determination, which was so characteristic of him he again took up the occupation of farming, later adding to this the mercantile, lumber and cotton ginning business of which he made a success.

Editor Democrat:—No news to chronicle today except bad news. Just as the farmers of this community had gotten down to business preparing for a crop we were visited by a death dealing cyclone which introduced itself by paying its respects to our saw mill man, U S Crittenden, demolishing his barn, crippling his buggy horse and doing considerable damage to his dwelling. It seemed to increase its rage and when it struck the lovely home of Calip King "Oak Heights" it destroyed every thing in sight, houses, fences, all went as chaff before the wind, killing a fine mare worth \$175 and blowing a fine milch cow several hundred yards. There were over a hundred citizens viewed the awful destruction the next day, Friday March 14. The place where a few days ago a beautiful residence could be seen from the Lexington road just 10 miles south of Lawrenceburg, erected in a magnificent oak grove overlooking the crystal stream of Blue Water for three miles or more, the position from which it took its appropriate name "Oak Heights," alas one can only see devastation on the hill, the giant oaks that seemed to nod a welcome to the passer by or the visitor to the heights lies now as in

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Lawrence County Again in Cyclone

Lawrenceburg Hardest Hit But No Serious Damage Done

The cyclone which passed through the County on last Thursday night was equally as severe as that of the week before and Lawrenceburg was more damaged. A part of the chimneys of the residences of E. G. Parker and W. H. Phillips were blown down. Telephone poles were blown over and the negro Baptist church (hardly finished) was destroyed, trees were felled to the ground and a great deal of damage done at Ethridge and Leoma. No lives were lost or serious injury to other persons or stock has so far been reported.
