Rugby is situated in Morgan County, in East Tennessee. It is seven miles from Sedgemoor Station, on the Cincinnati Southern Railway, running between Cincinnati, Ohio, and Chattanooga, Tennessee. From the former city Sedgemoor is 221 miles, and from the latter 114 miles.
