MEMPHIS, August 23, 1862.

Business was very dull on the wharf yesterday. The river is still declining. At St. Louis it is falling, with 11 1/2 feet water above low tide of December, 1860.

There is 6 1/2 feet in the channel of the lower Mississippi out to Cairo, as reported by the last boat down.

The Ohio river is in a wretched condition, so far as depth of channel is concerned. There is but 20 inches water on Rising Sun bar.

The Illinois river is falling slowly from Lesalle to the mouth. There is still 10 feet in the channel.

The upper Mississippi is falling all the way from St. Paul down. There is 1/2 feet full on the upper and 3 feet on the lower rapids.

Between St. Paul and the head of Lake Pepin there is 3 feet full on the worst bars.

The Missouri river is reported to be falling slowly from Leavenworth down to the mouth, with 4 feet in the channel on the shoalest bars.

The steamer Dunleith, which was sunk and broken on the falls a few weeks ago, has been straightened up, pumped out and launched.

The launching was done Saturday, and she now floats at anchor in the chute opposite Louisville.

WEEKLY MEMPHIS MARKET.

COTTON.—A good deal changing hands, but prices have a wide range, say from 23 to 40c. 500 bales were purchased on the river from miles above this city at 27c, payable when on board. A St. Louis man made the purchase, and Memphis furnished the funds. 400 bales compressed cotton, which had been used in bulkheads of gun boats, and in the worst possible condition of damage, were sold at auction on board the steamer Soline yesterday in account of government. The bidding was very spirited, and the cotton was finally knocked down at 37c per bale. Should be a Cotton advance to 65c, the purchaser will have a good thing of it. At present prices his loss is estimated at \$1,000 to \$1,200.

SUGAR.—Very light offering, 90c per lb.

MOLASSES.—None reported; we renew last week's quotations, 25c per gal.

FLOUR.—Market quiet; this being the dangerous month, holders are anxious to realize. Our mills are ready to commence grinding, but they lack a supply of grain.

WHEAT AND RYE.—None in the market.

CORN.—Price nominal at 45c.

OATS.—Will bring 50c, readily, market advancing.

POTATOES.—Large receipts have caused the market to give way, though one-half the supply has gone to Helena. Quote at 75c per bush.

ONIONS.—Remarks on potatoes applicable.

GREEN APPLES.—20 bbls good at \$2.75.

WHISKEY.—Market well supplied; price speculative.

HAY.—No sales.

MEAL.—Fresh, 55c, stale, 50c.

HONEY.—\$1.20 per bush.

BACON.—Hams have largely advanced; S. C. cured 10c higher. The want of country trade makes clear sides nominal at 60c, as in condition, no joints offering.

PORK.—Mess 10c, M. O. 9c. No sales.

LARD.—5 bbls 95c; we quote kegs 20c higher.

BUTTER.—Sales of good in kegs at 17c.

EGGS.—6 bbls at \$12 1/2 bid, in demand.

FISH.—Market No. 1 \$5.00 per box, No. 2 \$4.50 per box, No. 3 \$4.00 per box.

SALT.—Large supply, and only retail demand. Our merchants cannot obtain permits to receive salt, but government officers supply the market on private speculation. We noted a sale yesterday of 200 bbls Kanawha at \$4.50 per bbl, and 20 bbls do same, and a small lot of 25 bbls Lake salt at same. Several parcels on consignment to store are limited at \$5 for Kanawha and \$5.50 for Lake. Articles, however, held on speculation, are at the true index of the market.

CHICKENS.—Ready sale at 18c per dozen.

BRAN.—3 lots, of 50 tons, 75 thousand 100 tons, have been purchased by three different parties to hold for an advance; as freight has advanced, the balance of the cargo is at higher figures.

BEANS.—Good Navy \$1.60, a lot of 1,000 boxes offered, very slight bid in Cincinnati.

COAL OIL.—20 bbls at 63c per gallon, Tennessee money.

WINE.—Market overstocked with Oatmeal offering at 55c per bush.

HEADQUARTERS, DISTRICT OF WEST TENNESSEE, MEMPHIS, Tennessee, August 13, 1862.

All non-residents of this District, found within the same, who, at home, would be subject to draft, will be liable to be drafted under the supervision of the local commanders where they may be found, and in case of a draft being made by their respective States, an equal proportion will be drawn from persons thus enrolled. Persons so drawn will at once be assigned to troops from the States to which they owe military service, and the Executive thereof notified at such draft.

All violations of trade by Army followers may be punished by confiscation of stock in trade, and the assignment of the offenders to do military duty as private soldiers.
