DEATH OF FIRST SELECTMAN GALVIN

End Came Tuesday in Memorial Hospital.

A CAREER OF PUBLIC SERVICE

His Life in Brattleboro Had Been Closely Identified With the Town's Progress—Death Followed an Operation Which Revealed Growth.

John Galvin, 57, chairman of Brattleboro's board of selectmen and for over 25 years closely identified with the public life of the town, died at 9:50 Tuesday morning in the Memorial Hospital. The immediate cause of death was hemorrhage following an operation performed by Dr. Maurice Richardson of Boston to relieve jaundice caused by a cancerous condition of the pancreas. Mr. Galvin had been in poor health since early in the fall although he attended to his business duties regularly until six weeks ago today when on the advice of his physician he determined to remain at home until his condition showed signs of improvement. His illness at first appeared to be nothing more serious than a bilious attack, but when it did not respond to the usual treatment his family feared more serious trouble. Three weeks ago a consultation of physicians was held and a slight difference of opinion as to its immediate need. On Thursday of last week

Besides his wife he leaves a son, John E. Galvin, and four daughters, Misses Katherine M., Agnes E., Anna D., and Maxine E., all of whom made their home with their parents on Walnut street. Miss Maxine Galvin is a violin student at the New England Conservatory of Music. He has also survived by a sister, Miss Julia Galvin of Hartford, Conn., the only member of the family of Dennis Galvin now living; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Josephine (Dunham) Galvin, and a nephew, Donald Galvin, also of Middlebury.

Disinterested public service was one of the chief characteristics of John Galvin's life in this town. His loyalty to Brattleboro and his interest in its progress were never less than earnest and his generous measure of time, thought and effort which he gave to the solution of public questions was prompted solely by his sense of duty. None of these things were done for the sake of honor or for the sake of a title.
