Death of Roy Daley. Roy Daley, who has been sick with pneumonia since the 18th of September, died Thursday evening at 6:30 at his home on Elm street, East Side. Roy was 33 years, 9 months and 14 days old, the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Daley of Newport. In June, 1904, he married Miss Nellie Baker, and to them two children have been born, Gladys, who is 13, and Walter 10 years of age. He was employed by the Boston & Maine railroad, beginning his railroad career when only 15 years of age, as call boy, then as office boy. While the office offered him some very attractive positions, he being of a very active nature chose the outside work and became brakeman, later taking the position of yard conductor which he held to his death. He was a member of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, also a member of Co. H Home Guards, holding the office of sergeant, and later being appointed top sergeant. He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, Nellie Daley, two children, Gladys and Walter, a father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Daley, one sister, Mrs. Gladys Percy of Newport, and three brothers, Gerald of Newport, Private Raymond Daley of the infantry, who is overseas, and P. F. C. Claude Daley, in the medical department, stationed at the Walter Reid Hospital, Decoma Park, Wash. The funeral services were held Sunday at 2 o'clock at the home. Rev. James Hepburn, Episcopal minister of Stanstead, officiated. Burial was in Pine Grove Cemetery. The bearers were four brothers-in-law, Charles and Don Mayo, Carl Percy and Leon Leach. Co. H Home Guards attended in a body, escorting the remains to the cemetery, sounding taps at the grave. The floral offerings testified to the high esteem in which Roy was held, and included a wreath, B. of R. T. No. 339; wreath, Co. H, Home Guards; spray roses, Court Honor 1244; spray from school grades 5 and 8, and many flowers from the friends. The family have the sympathy of a large circle of friends.
